



Way Open for a Modus. London, Sept. 5.—The second edition of The Times, issued this moriling, contains a despatch from Pretoria under date of Sept. 4, saying: "The predominant view is a that the last despatch opens up the way to a modus vivendi, inasmuch as the pro-posals of Mr. Chamberlain (British Secre-tary of State for the Colonies) relating to the seven years' franchise have been prac-tically complied with. This is the result of the influence of Herr Fischer (the spe-cial agent of the Orange Free State) with the Raad." The despatch, however, is at variance with the editorial views on the matter ex-pressed by The Times this morning. in London. London, Sept. 6 .- The Premier, the Marquis of Salisbury, will come to London to-day (Wednesday) from Walmer to confer with the Secretary of State for the Colonies, Mr. Joseph Chamberlain, and a Cabinet Council has been summoned for Friday. urgent messages having been sent to all the Ministers requesting their attendance.
