TORONTO-GEORGIAN BAY R.R.

The Railway Committee at Ottawa Had the Bill Before Them Again Yesterday.

MR. McMULLEN WAS OPPOSED TO IT

Toronto Largely Interested in the Bill—Mr. Watson Asked for Fair Play.

Ottawa, June 19.—Mr. Brodeur presided over the meeting of the Railway Committee this morning, when the Toronto and Georgian Bay Short Line bill was brought up.

Mr. McMillen opposed the bill, in which he said Toronto was particularly interested.

Mr. Brodeur read petitions against the bill from the Owen Sound Board of Trade and the Ontario Ship Railway.

Mr. Sproule turned Mr. McMillen's argument against him by pointing out that the Ontario Ship Railway, and reminded Mr. McMillen that the rules of the House prevented him, as a director of the company, from taking any part in the discussion of these bills.

H. WALTER WEBB DEAD.

Well-Known American Railroad Man Passes Away After a Long Illness.

New York, June 19.—Henry Walter Webb died yesterday at his residence, Beechwood, Scarborough-on-the-Hudson. His death was due to heart failure.

He had been suffering for months from tuberculosis, but recently he had been improving and gaining strength.

Mr. Webb was born in 1838, when he undertook the management and reorganization of the Wagner Palace Car Company. His brother, Dr. W. Seward Webb, had married a sister of Cornelius Vanderbilt, and the Vanderbilts were quick to recognize Mr. Webb's ability. In 1888 he was called into the executive office of the New York Central, and for a year acted as its assistant to President Depew.

In March, 1890, he was appointed third vice-president and was placed in charge of the operating department. Three years ago he had an attack of typhoid fever, which nearly proved fatal. In March, 1898, he was compelled to resign his office in the New York Central.
