

OTTAWA'S CHIEF EXPLAINS

One of the Charges Made Against Him in Writing Receives an Answer.

HE SHIELDED INNOCENT PARTIES

One of the Leading Families in Canada Was Concerned in the Matter.

Ottawa, July 19.—Among the charges against Chief of Police Powell is one that he took out of the cells one night at 10:30 a young woman named Mary De Serquigny, who was accused of attempted murder, and that he kept her out until nearly 11 o'clock. The chief's defence has been made in writing. The case was one in which a girl named Mary De Serquigny gave birth to a child on a train while coming to Ottawa, and the baby fell off into the snow. It was found and the girl and mother, Miss De Serquigny, were arrested. The latter was acting as nurse. The chief says that Miss De Serquigny was in the cells told her to go to the head of the family, the man was ill, but his wife, who was a sister of Miss De Serquigny, came to the cells at 9:45 the night mentioned, and put up at the Russell. From finding out who the lady was, Powell says he took Miss De Serquigny under arrest, to the hotel, and while there the lady, who had just arrived, became hysterical and had to be attended to. She was taken to a room and the nurse looked after her for a while, then the chief took her back to the police station at 11:40 p.m. The chief does not mention the name of the family.

YACHT CAPSIZED

A. C. COLBURN OF PHILADELPHIA AND TWO DAUGHTERS DROWNED

New Haven, Conn., July 19.—Five persons were drowned in Long Island Sound yesterday afternoon by the capsizing of the yacht *Venusta* of Philadelphia. Only two of those on the yacht were saved. The drowned are: Arthur C. Colburn, owner of the yacht, and his daughters Ida and Annette Colburn, of Philadelphia; Capt. Flint, master of the yacht, and an unknown sailor. The others on board the ill-fated craft were Mrs. Walter J. Sprinkle, daughter of Mr. Colburn, and the steward, James Stangor, who were rescued by the tug *Albatross* for two hours to the bottom of the capsized boat.

MISTAKEN FOR BURGLAR

Sidney Bristol Shot and Killed by His Classmate, Morton Cressy

Battleboro, Vt., July 19.—Morton Starr Cressy of Hartford, Conn., shot and killed his friend and classmate at Yale and the Harvard Law School, Sidney Bristol of Battle Creek, Mich., at 2:40 o'clock, this morning in a bedroom at the home of Cressy's grandmother, Mrs. P. Starr, in this town.

It is thought that Bristol, who came here yesterday as a canvasser and was invited by Cressy to stay over night, while sleeping, was mistaken for a burglar.

U.S. WILL HOLD MORRO CASTLE

Washington, July 19.—It is the intention of the administration to hold the town of Morro Castle at the entrance to Havana harbor, a high authority announced. The United States will occupy, control and defend the fortress with U.S. troops, equipping it with modern artillery in order that Cuba may be secured in defending herself against outside interference, and also that the United States may thus have a guarantee against future attacks on the part of the Cuban government to carry out its pledges.

BELIEVE SHE WAS STRANGLED

Albany, N.Y., July 19.—Mrs. Minnie Lawrence, aged 27, the wife of an Italian fruit dealer named Antonio Lawrence, was found lying in the rear of the store of her husband in a semi-comatose condition shortly after noon today. She was removed to the Hotel Hamilton Hospital, where she died within an hour. It is the belief of the police that she was strangled. Her husband has been arrested.

HICKLEY FINED \$4000.

Jamestown, N.Y., July 19.—The jury in the Lane case in the Federal Court gave a verdict of acquittal today. Lang is a Rochester customs official, and was indicted with others on the charge of conspiracy to rob the government of customs duties on a large scale. E. T. Hickley, a Rochester tobaccoist, who was implicated with Lang, pleaded guilty to the charge, and was sentenced to pay a fine of \$4000. Austin Rush, who also pleaded guilty, has not been sentenced.

SHOT BY A WAITER

New York, July 19.—Frank Cannon, a white man, was killed in a Sixth Avenue barroom early this morning by John Park, a negro waiter. Parker accused Cannon of stealing a dollar from behind the bar. Cannon denied that he had taken the money, and Parker shot him twice, killing him almost instantly.

BUT FOUR BLACK HORSES.

Toronto Will Furnish Two for the Duke of York's Escort.

Ottawa, July 19.—Some misapprehension exists in regard to the mounted escort required to accompany the Duke and Duchess of York. It has been stated that black horses will be required, two at Montreal and two at Toronto. They are intended for the Duke of Roxburgh and Lord Trenchard, who will ride on each side of the royal carriage. The reason these officers need black horses is that they belong to the House of Commons (Hunt), a crack regiment of the Household Cavalry, having mounts of dark hue.

The Mourning Order.

The order given by the King with respect to wearing mourning seems to have been misunderstood. The period of mourning for Queen Victoria expires on July 24, but it was announced that ladies and gentlemen mourning while the Duke and Duchess of Cornwall and York were visiting the Dominion. Inquiry was made of the Imperial authorities what signs of mourning military officers should wear, and the reply came back that they should display bands of crepe.

K.O.T.M. ASSESSMENTS.

Port Huron, Mich., July 19.—The Supreme Court of Michigan has decided that all old members must be re-elected on the same plan as new members at the age which they joined the order. The system of medical examination also has been changed, so that hereafter in every city of over 2500 population the Supreme Board of Trustees will appoint as many medical examiners as it pleases.

FRIARS WILL STAY.

Manila, July 19.—The Catholic authorities in Manila say they have no intention of withdrawing the friars from the Philippine islands, and reiterate their belief that the friars will be welcomed by the masses of the Philippine people as their spiritual advisers when the people are thoroughly cured of the friars' no longer exercise temporal authority.

HEAVY DAMAGES AWARDED.

Ottawa, July 19.—In the Exchequer Court this morning Mr. Justice Burridge gave judgment in the Queen v. The British American Bank Note Company, compensating the company for \$80,000 in damages for having supplied lithographed stamps instead of engraved.

BLONDIN CAPTURED.

Quebec, July 19.—Blondin, who is accused of having murdered his wife at Lowell, Mass., some three months ago, has just been discovered and arrested at St. Anne des Monts. He has been incarcerated at Rimouski.

WILL TIE UP LAKE VESSELS.

Bay City, July 19.—A demand has been presented to the Michigan Log Floating Commission that all non-union captains and engineers be replaced by union men by Saturday morning, or the entire fleet of lake vessels owned by the company will be tied up.

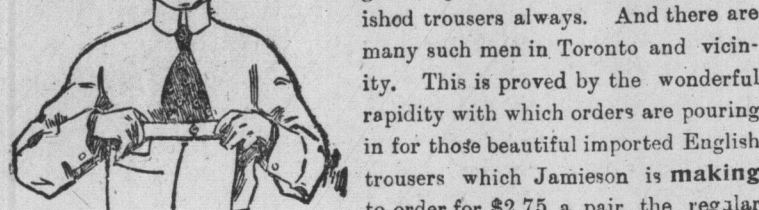
