American League Appoints Committee to Confer With National.

Chicago, Dec. 22.—The annual meeting of the American League, which was to have been held here to-day, was changed into a special meeting and the annual will be held in New York, Jan. 1.

The principal business transacted to-day was the appointment of a committee to represent the National League at Cincinnati, Jan. 5, to confer on peace terms between the two baseball organizations. The question was quickly disposed of by the unanimous adoption of a resolution giving President Ban Johnson absolute power to appoint his own committee or to be the sole representative of the league and to make such arrangements with full power to act for the American League. President Johnson thought it would be the better plan to have a committee meet the National League, also, and to discuss and to decide.

The committee is composed of President Johnson, Charles A. Gumpers, Chief Henry Krause, Charles A. Boston and Charles Sousa of Cleveland.

I am, however, not taking it unnecessary that any holder of contracts should be immediately advised that they should be summarily sold out of notice to the advantage of those who have not yet made up their minds to sell.
