THE PHILIPPINES.

The Philippines are a group of slands more than 400 in number, southeast of Hong Kong, forming the northern part of the great Malay Archipelago. On the islands there is a Spain claims sovereignty over about threefourths of this number, the remainder being governed by independent native princes subject to their own laws and customs. The principal island in the Philippines is Luzon, in area about the same size as the State of New York, with a population of about 2,-500,000. The chief city of Luzon, and the capital of the group of islands, is Manila. It has a population of about 160,000.

The Spaniards claim sovereignty over the Philippines through their discovery in 1521 by Magellan. There are comparatively few Spaniards in the islands, but they have claimed sovereignty over them for 300 years. The Philippines have proved a valuable possession for Spain, for the islands are rich in fruit and mineral and vegetable products. Among the leading articles of export are tobacco, sugar cane, Manila hemp, coffee and coa, oranges, bananas, pine-apples, cinnamon and other spices. A considerable commerce has been established between the Philippines and the United States. Spain has derived enormous revenue from these islands by taxing inordinately the native population.

NO NEWS FROM DEWEY TILL THURSDAY. Washington, May 4.—The navy department estimates that it will take from 34 to 36 hours for the Hugh Mc-Culloch to steam from Manila to Hong Kong with dispatches from Dewey. It is not believed, however, that he would send the cutter away until he had completed the capture of Manila. With 24 hours' notice from Sunday noon for the Spaniards to get out or surrender, the bombardment would begin Monday noon, the time the cable was cut. London, May 4.—The Brussels correspondent of the Daily Chronicle says: Don Carlos, the pretender, is much agitated by private telegrams he has received today from Madrid. A Spanish diplomatist of high position said to me today: "They are practicalbeginning of the end of the regency. The queen regent may make a fina. effort in favor of her son; but he will
