The entrance on Dundas street is nviting enough. It is finished in natural oak, and is superbly lighted. On one side is a splendid cigar stand supplied with everything to please the moker. This is a very fine department, and has one of the largest and finest assortments of cigars, tobaccos, pipes, and everything of that nature. Anything a smoker wants is there. On the opposite side is a fine shoe thine parlor, one of the very best. On both sides, a little further up, are

finely equipped offices for the popular manager, Mike Foley and his staff. The Alleys. At the rear are the bowling alleys, seven in number. These alleys were built by the Brunswick, Balke, Collender Company, and are of the finest. They are very true, the truest alleys in the city, according to old and experienced bowlers. In spite of the fact that they are new, and the pins new,

some excellent scores have already been made. These alleys have become most popular and are busy all the time. There are a number of lockers for the use of bowlers. Billiard Parlor.

A fine staircase leads up to the billiard parlor. This stair is luxuriously carpeted. On the pillars are two splendid, hand-painted globes, which add greatly to the appearance f the place. The stairway branches off to both

sides about half way up, and then the billiard hall is entered. This room is richly furnished. Twenty-seven pool and three billiard tables form the equipment, and they are the best that are made. They were all selected peronally by the manager, Mr. Foley. The walls are decorated with fine nirrors, which reflect the brilliance of many lights.

Large crowds are present every morning, afternoon and evening in this hall, and it is now one of the popular rendezvous of the city. The billiard hall is indeed a bower of beauty. It is so roomy, a place that no matter how many are in it there never seems to be any crowding.

Downstairs there are also a hat cleaning stand, cane and umbrella cases, etc., which add not a little to the appearance and convenience of






