LET US SAVE OUR BOYS FROM DEATH IN RIVER!

Every summer London loses so many of its young citizens by drowning in the River Thames.

The Thames is a stream that should not drown anyone. Its breadth is not great. Its depth is not great. Its current is not swift. And perhaps its very apparent harmlessness is the undoing of many a youngster.

But it has taken three lives in a few weeks, and this loss of life, this waste of life, is horrible.

London should have a river patrol of some sort that will endeavor to supervise swimming, and to protect boys from their own venturesomeness.

Don't try to keep the boys out of the river. That is is the way most London boys must learn to swim. But do try to save them. As a city do not let us stand aside, and when a stark little body has been hauled up on the bank stand staring for a moment and then pass on, doing

We waste big bank rolls in London so that life may be saved theoretically. But here is the chance to save life actually. If some effort is not made to supervise swimming in the river more boys will be drowned. AT LEAST LET THE DANGEROUS PLACES BE MARKED SO THAT THE LITTLE FELLOWS WILL NOT FALL INTO THEM.

Meanwhile parents should bring the drownings to the attention of their children. Let the lesson of going into eep and unknown waters be forced home. Let a father or big brother go with the children when they swim. Let evelybody do what he or she can to save the lives of these little children of the humble home who cannot go to and pay 50 cents for a bathing suit. Better that the lity should "shoot" a little of its money this way than to be so lavish in expenditures for absolute pleasure.
