I mean some place where these young people would feel free to go and be alone if they wished. Young people don't want to go to a big party every night. They don't want to go to a picture show every night. But where can they go, if not there? In the summer there are the parks. But what a poor substitute for a home.

Do you know what I heard the other day. That young couples actually frequent our unsightly old Grand Trunk Station, just because they may kiss each other without comment, when the trains come in. Don't you think it's time someone did something? Isn't there some way whereby these young people might have the advantage of a cozy grate fire and comfortable chairs, where they might chat (yes, and do their kissing) in private? Why must they be driven out onto the street?
