



Use any good soil—sandy and loamy about equal parts, with a little hen manure added. Have pot of medium size, six or eight inches across; after potting, set pot in a dish of lukewarm water until soil is well soaked, then put in partial shade until growth starts; keep in bright place (in sun if not too hot), and water with warm water. Should show signs of bloom about November 15, and again in the spring.
