GREAT THROG AT LATE MR. DARLING'S FUNERAL

North Toronto Man Pays Stiff Fine For Liquor Selling—Big Time in East Toronto.

LAMBTON, April 12.—(Special.)—In the presence of one of the largest throngs gathered at a public funeral in this district in many a long day, all that was mortal of the late William Darling was this afternoon committed to its last resting place in St. George's Cemetery.

That the late Mr. Darling was greatly beloved needed not this afternoon's immense concourse of sorrowing friends to demonstrate, but that he had in a marked manner formed strong and deep business and social ties in city and country was shown in the widely scattered districts represented at the last sad rite.

At the family residence, north of the Dundas-road, the funeral services were conducted by Rev. Mr. McWhongie and again at the cemetery. The late Mr. Darling had for nearly two score years been identified with the work of St. George's Church, and his remains were to-day interred in the family plot. The chief mourners were the widow, sons and daughter.

The casket was piled high with floral offerings, among others one from the family with the word "Father" interwoven. EAST TORONTO, April 12.—(Special.)—One of the most enjoyable functions ever held in the town was that of the Men's Forward Missionary Movement in Hope Methodist Church to-night, followed by a sumptuous luncheon prepared by the Ladies' Aid of the church. BRINGING BACK BRIBER TO PITTSBURG COURTS

Hoffstot, Prominent Financier, Refuses to Leave New York Unless Extradited.

PITTSBURG, Pa., April 12.—All further probing of councilmanic graft has been temporarily suspended by the adjournment of the special grand jury to-day until next Monday. In the meantime it is expected that Frank N. Hoffstot, under indictment in connection with bribing councilmen, will be brought from New York to answer the indictments.

Extradition papers were made out to-day, and to-night an assistant district attorney left for Harrisburg, where Governor Edwin E. Stuart is expected to sign them to-morrow. The papers will then be carried to Governor Hughes at Albany where it is expected they will arrive Thursday morning. District Attorney Blakeley will go to Albany and ask Governor Hughes to grant extradition.

When Governor Hughes shall have signed the papers, Hoffstot, contrary to the procedure, will not be placed in custody of an officer, but will be expected to appear before the Allegheny county courts. This concession was made because of the standing of his counsel in the community, former City Solicitor B. Rogers, who promised to produce his client when the extradition was granted.

The trials of seven councilmen, that had been scheduled for to-morrow, will probably be over until next week. Judge Fraser to-day ruled that Harrison Nesbit, the former national bank examiner, who was alleged to be incompetent to serve as foreman of the grand jury, was competent. Judge Fraser holds that the jurors are not required to be qualified voters.

NORTH TORONTO.

NORTH TORONTO, April 12.—(Special.)—Magistrate Ramden held court in the town hall here this morning. Two cases of illegal selling of liquor came before the attention of the court. One of these was James Dick of the Daville Hotel and the other Joseph Ready of the Outcote House.

J. W. Curry appeared for Mr. Ready and pleaded guilty, a fine of \$125 being imposed.

In the case of James Dick, L. Monahan, representing the town, brought in a number of witnesses, but their evidence was for the most part of a contradictory nature and the magistrate dismissed the case. Mr. Dick was represented by S. W. McEwan.

A special meeting of the public school board will be held on Thursday evening. The sites and management committee are prepared to recommend three sites for the proposed new Bedford Park school, and out of these a selection will doubtless be made.

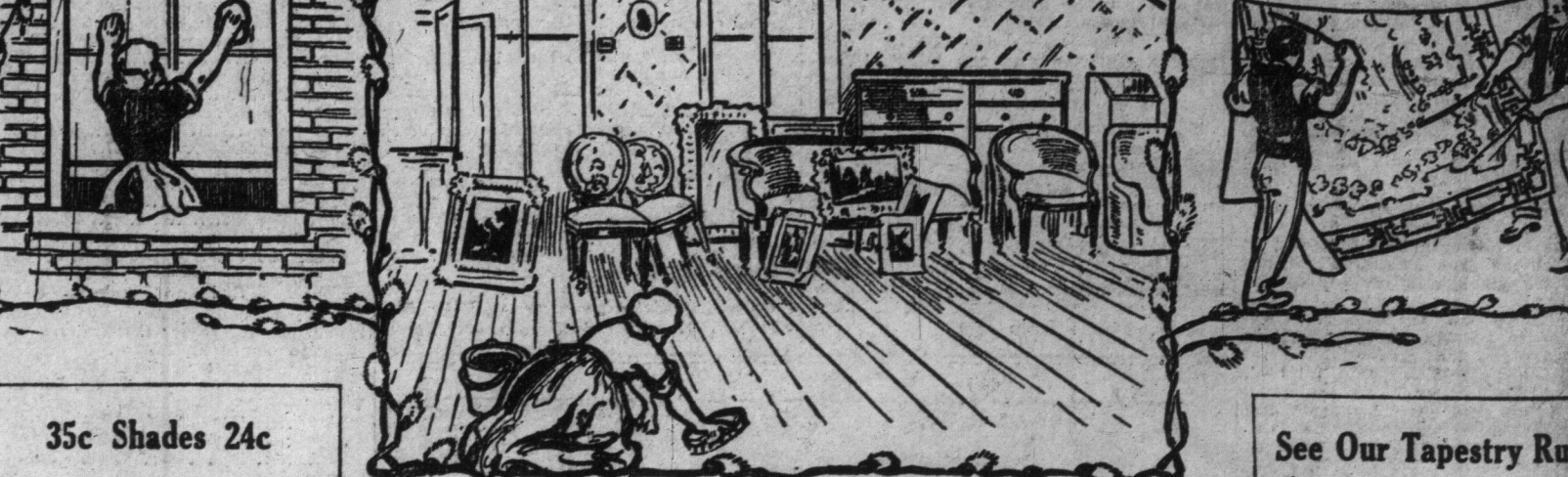

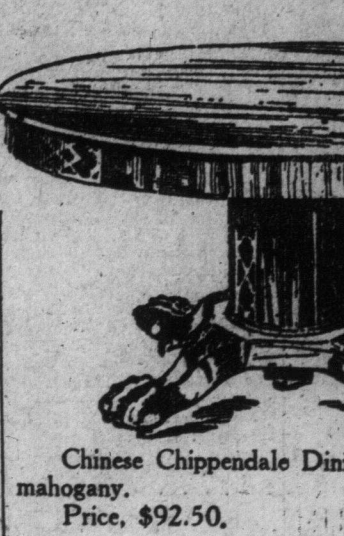
