PITTSBURG, Pa., April 12.-All furher probing of councilmanic graft has been temporarily suspended by the adjournment of the special grand jury to-day until next Monday. In the meantime it is expected that Frank N. Hoffstot, under indictment in connection with bribing councilmen, will be brought from New York to answer the indictments.

Extradition papers were made out to-day, and to-night an assistant district attorney left for Harrisburg. where Governor Edwin S. Stuart is expected to sign them to-morrow.
