MRS. BANWELL IS CHIPPER OVER \$40,000 BANK THEFT CHARGE

Arraigned With Her Husband at Toronto, She Smiled at All Hands as She Gets Bail.

Toronto, March 1.—(Special)—A tremendous crowd thronged the police court this morning when E. St. George Banwell and his wife were arraigned before the magistrate, three hours after their arrival from Jamaica with Detective Black.

Mrs. Banwell was the chief centre of interest. There was not the slightest indication in her bearing that she was subjected to a charge of participating in the theft of \$40,000. She looked even less wilted than the ordinary lady passenger would after so hurried a through trip from Halifax, and smiled at Magistrate Deane's denials and howls of indignation as though the occasion were a society function.

Banwell himself looked fairly cheerful, though his cheerfulness apparently required some effort to keep up. His spirits fell somewhat when the magistrate declined to let him out on bail, and committed him to jail till Monday.

Mrs. Banwell was allowed out on \$5,000 recognizance. "Thank you, judge," said Mrs. Banwell sweetly, and then turned to sympathize with her less fortunate husband.

The Banwells pleaded not guilty and elected to be tried by jury.

When the Dreadnought Took the Water



The Dreadnought Taking the Water From the Sphere

The battleship Dreadnought, according to the Naval and Military Review of Plymouth (Eng.), marks an important advance on any war ship afloat. It is curious to note that in some respects she recalls her namesake, launched in 1875, since both are remarkable as having the special characteristics of carrying an armament composed entirely of guns of the largest calibre, and a cruising heavier and more extensive than any of their respective predecessors.

The difference is that the first Dreadnought carried only 12-inch guns on a displacement of 10,820 tons, whereas the vessel released from the building slip on Feb. 10 will have a uniform armament of 12-inch guns, and, it is believed in the best informed circles—on a displacement which will certainly be less than twice that of her predecessor of the same name. The two conditions which have governed the design of the Dreadnought are speed, and regard having also been paid to protection.

The Russo-Japanese war has confirmed the theories of naval experts in providing new battleships and cruisers with a uniform armament of the largest type of gun combined with high speed, which will give them the advantage of forcing an action.

These are the predominant features of the Dreadnought, and will give her a fighting value which no other war ship afloat possesses. The superiority resulting from the embodiment of a concentration of heavy guns, the best attained by comparing the Dreadnought's uniform armament of 12-inch guns with ships fitted with a mixed armament.

NO DIVIDEND ON DOMINION COAL

Vice-president at Annual Meeting Predicts Better Statement Next Year.

Montreal, March 1.—(Special)—At the annual meeting of the Dominion Coal Company today Vice-President Wanklin, in response to an inquiry as to when shareholders might expect a dividend, stated that while nothing could be promised the outstanding obligations of the company were being wiped off the books in so satisfactory a manner that he thought it likely the shareholders would have reason to be very pleased with the next annual report.

It was stated, in reply, that the contract with the Dominion Iron & Steel Company, is a 99 years contract, the price being subject to revision every five years.

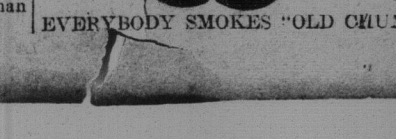
The output of the company was 3,180,670 tons for 1905, as compared with 3,023,322 tons for 1904.

The net earnings were \$1,573,832.19, as compared with \$1,620,473.33 for 1904. During the year \$497,953.19 was expended on capital account.

The assets of the company aggregate \$27,997,129.14.

ST. STEPHEN UNANIMOUS FOR CITY WATER SUPPLY

Not a Dissenting Vote Yesterday Against Plan to Get New Service—Expect Other Towns to Join Them.

St. Stephen, N. B., March 1.—(Special)—Municipal ownership scored a great triumph when St. Stephen voted on the question of ownership of a water plant. The result of the vote, which was an open one, was a property vote of \$83,350 out of an assessed valuation of \$1,082,000 and a personal vote of 399.

Not a negative vote was cast in either of the three wards. The above wonderful result was obtained without solicitation of any person. The question was: Shall the town install a system of water works having as a source of supply a well near Maxwell's Crossing, about 3 1/2 miles from town?
