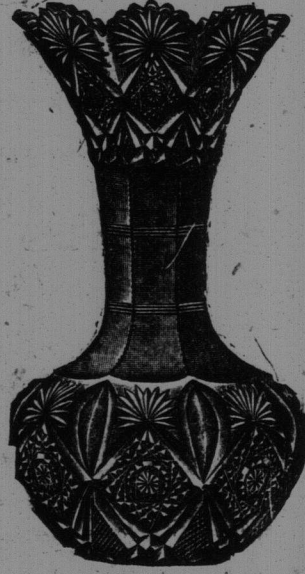

Provincial
Fredericton lumbermen have heard that the New Brunswick Land and Railway Company have increased their stumpage charge 25 cents per thousand, the advance to go into effect next season. The New Brunswick Land and Railway Company has extensive holdings throughout the province, a great deal of which is included in the best timber land of the province. It is estimated that about 50,000,000 feet per year in cut on company's lands and it will thus be seen that the company's receipts, owing to the increase, will be considerably enlarged.
