SHYING AT WORDS.

Strange to say, there are persons who shun the words "drafted" and "conscript." The suggestion has even been made that "chosen" should be used as a sort of euphemism for those whose feelings are made raw by what they regard as the harsher words. Thus we should call the great body of young men now gathering to defense of democracy, the "chosen army." Somebody has set forth this quotation from the Bible: "I have chosen you and ordained you that ye should go."

But, after all, "conscript" is a good word, devoid of sinister meaning; its literal significance is merely "a writing together"—that is, an enrollment. And draft comes from a word that means to draw. There is no ignominy attached to having one's name written and then to have it drawn for a particular purpose. "Conscript" father's was a name applied to the Roman Senate—because their names were written in the senate's register.
