BASKETBALL.

Local Boys Win.

Emporia, Kan., March 19—"Dummy" Taylor, former pitcher for the New York Giants will be one of the Kansas State League umpires for the coming season. In calling his decisions Taylor will use a whistle, blowing once for strikes and twice for balls. A special code will be worked out for base decisions. Free Gafford believes that Taylor is especially fitted for the work because he cannot hear the rattling of the fans, and the disputing of decisions by players will be minimized for the same reason.

AQUATIC.

Harvard's Shell Returned.

The eight-oared shell in which the Harvard second varsity crew won first honors at the Henley regatta in England in July, 1914, has arrived in Cambridge after much delay. It will be used for rowing men who are candidates for this year's varsity crew.

The Harvard shell was packed for shipping after the winning of the Grand Challenge Cup in England, but its shipment back to the United States was delayed on account of the war that broke out soon afterward.

BASEBALL.

Athletics Won.

Jacksonville, Fla., March 18—For the first time this spring since Connie Mack brought his Athletics south for priming, he placed his full strength on the field today. The Mackmen checked the winning march of Roger Bresnahan's Chicago Cubs in the fifth grapple of the series of six by a 6 to 4 count. It was the first reverse the National League has met this year.

Outplayed at all angles were the Cubs. Fifteen hits for twenty-one total bases by the Mackmen recalled old times. The deliveries of Herb Pennock and "Scout" Wofford were nifty for ten safe blows, but they were kept widely scattered with the exception of Pennock's fifth inning, when Bresnahan's men bagged three runs.

Aside from the victory, the contest developed a bit of interesting news for the followers of Mack. Rubie Oldring is slated to fill J. Franklin Baker's vacated post at third base. Oldring played there and accepted all of three chances and contributed two runs and a single. Mack is determined to get hitting prowess in his lineup for American League pennant scrap. Bill Kopf and other candidates for the third bag assignment thus far have failed to come through with the base hit blows necessary for them to land the infield job.

With Oldring at the hot corner, Mack is in a position to shift the left field position among three comers.

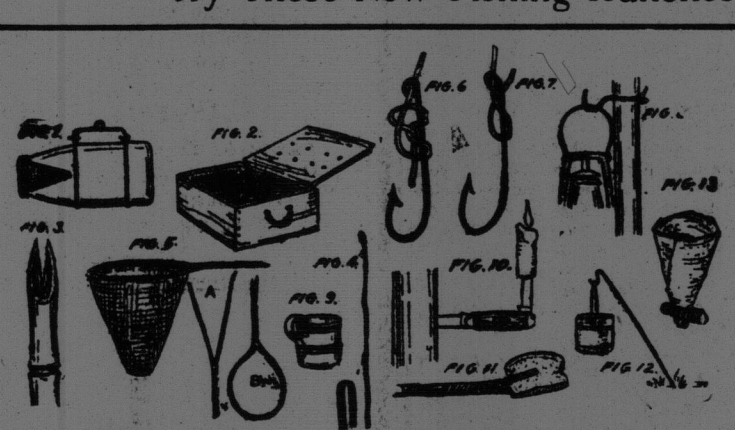

Get Ready For First Nibble, Boys;
Try These New Fishing Hunches

Printed by special arrangement with the American Boy Magazine. How're you fixed for fishing, fellows? The season for good old sport is approaching fast. Why don't you organize a fishing club, and enjoy a little real adventure with hook and line this spring?

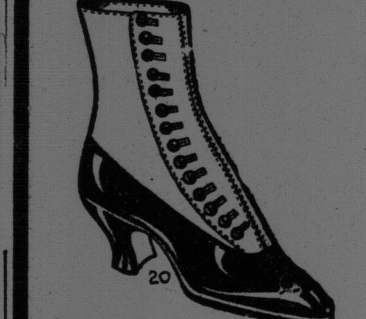
Here are a dozen suggestions of handy things to have about your fishing camp. Some will be especially useful if you want to rough it for a night on the banks of a stream or lake; others you'll need if you're going to spend only an hour with hook and line some morning or evening.

The first (Fig. 1) shows a minnow trap made from a fruit jar and a piece of fly screen. Remove the jar cover and fit the screen funnel as shown. Cut the flat part of the jar away and use the threaded part to hold the lap-over of the funnel in place.

The wire ball is useful to tie the jar to the dock and makes it easier to handle. Put some bread in the jar and sink it in about a foot of water. In an hour or so, you will have all the minnows you can use all day.

Fig. 2 pictures a bait box in which you can keep enough angleworms to last two weeks. A soap box filled with moist but not sticky wet clay, with a sod for a top and a perforated cover over all will serve your purpose well. The box is buried in its own depth under the porch or in any shady place. Once in three days throw coffee pot raisings to the angles and they will repay you by keeping fat and sleek. It is absolutely necessary to have clean, fresh, well-preserved bait for still fishing, and I know by experience that this box has no equal in helping you to accomplish this purpose.

Fig. 3 shows the end of the cane pole which forms the handle of the landing net shown in Fig. 5. The smallest sketches "A" and "B" show how the frame

it was. Even then it was hard to laugh at.

It happened in our world's series, with the Chicago Cubs—the first one. We had a great team, playing great ball and we expected to beat those Cubs and win back some of the honor they had grabbed away from us. Donovan was pitching and was going as good as he ever was—and that was going some.

Bill always smiles, and it is hard to make that smile come loose. He was smiling and happy when he came to bat and we had a chance to go ahead and clinch the game. Bill always was pretty dangerous as a batter considered from the pitcher's standpoint, and he caught a curve and drove the ball hard on the line to right field.

He had the happiest brand of his smile all over his face when he hit that ball. He started down to first at an easy lope, smiling proudly. I wasn't watching the ball; my eye was still on Bill and suddenly his face changed. You never saw

such a transformation scene in your life. The smile went away and that long jaw dropped. A look of positive terror came over his face and he started to try to get up speed.

I whistled just in time to see the cause of the transformation. Schulte had sprinted forward the instant the ball was hit and scooping it on the second bound, had shot to first base. Bill awakened just in time to realize Schulte had the jump on him.

That play broke our rally and probably changed the entire game for the Cubs beat us and ran away with the series. But Bill's change of expression when he saw what was going to happen was the funniest thing I ever witnessed—now, not then.
