



"COUNT" AND FRIEND ARRESTED AS SMUGGLERS
115 Pieces of Jewelry Found in One's Overcoat—False Bottom in Other's Trunk
New York, March 29—Two passengers on the steamer Demos, from Naples, one claiming to be a count, were arrested as they were about to leave Pier 6, South Brooklyn. They were charged with smuggling.

Potsdam, May 30—Emperor William remains at the palace where the healing progress of the abscess on his right wrist is being closely watched. This morning Dr. Frederick W. K. Iberg and Prof. Bier, the surgeon, issued a statement that they had found the trouble taking its normal course.
Montreal, May 30—A further examination of the United States dry dock Dewey, partially submerged at Orléans in Subig Bay was done deliberately by a band of conspirators.
St. Petersburg, May 30—M. Friedman, the Jewish member of the Duma who has championed the cause of the Jews whom the government has ordered banished from the Russian Cities and towns outside the pale, that restricted section of the Polish provinces and the Ukraine where they may legally reside, received today complaints that members of his caucus were being forbidden to the Caucasus to take the baths and receive medical treatment, were expelled by the local authorities and forbidden the residence of Jews in the Caucasus, but the government authorized visits to the baths during the season of 1910.

The body was in three feet of water.

SAFETY BOARD MATTERS FOR MEETING TONIGHT
The monthly meeting of the board of public works will hold this evening. It had been intended to have the meeting on Tuesday evening when tenders for permanent street pavement would be opened but, owing to the absence of Ald. Vanwart, chairman of the board of safety, a change was made in the date of meeting, the safety board going over to Wednesday evening and the tender board being held one day earlier than usual. As tenders for street work will not close until tomorrow it will be necessary to hold a meeting later to deal with them.

A number of matters are dealt with in the reports of the engineer. Regarding the petition that the name of that portion of Acadia street which lies south of High street, be changed to Ross street, he recommends that the request be complied with.
He recommends that tenders be called for the building of a sidewalk in Douglas avenue, from John Finch's residence, southward, at an estimated cost of \$270.
He recommends that the eastern sidewalk and carriage-way in Harris street be raised in the neighborhood of Harris' bank at an estimated cost of \$500; that Ward street be planed and been suggested; that eleven street watering places be provided on the northern side of Union street west, crossing the head of No. 4 berth, at a cost of \$600.
With regard to W. B. Tennant's objection to the dredging of Union street slip, the engineer says that the dredging recommended is on the northern side of the slip and will not interfere with Mr. Tennant's property on the southern side.
Regarding the timber for the pontoon at Reed's wharf, the only tender received was from Frank J. Lively and the order has been placed with him. The confirmation of the board is asked for.
A concrete retaining wall is recommended for Duke street along the front of David Lane's house. The cost is estimated \$200. The board recommended that permanent employees be granted vacations.
