

CARNEGIE GIFTS TO BRITISH COLONIES, \$10,000,000

FOUNDATION OFFICIALS PASS THROUGH CITY

Will Discuss With Maritime College Heads Matter of Amalgamation

IDEA OF MINIATURE FUSION IS SCOUTED

New York Representative Believes Original Scheme Still Possible

P. P. Keppell, of New York; James Bertram and M. A. Cartwright, officials of the Carnegie bequests in the various branches of the late millionaire's gift funds, passed through the city on the noon train en route to Halifax and Sackville, where they will discuss with the officials of Maritime Provincial universities the matter of college amalgamation, which has been mooted for a number of years, but temporarily halted through the non-participation of several religious institutions having their own forward schemes in motion.

Mr. Keppell told a Times-Star reporter that he and his associates were coming to this conference more particularly as listeners than with any proposals. Mr. Bertram is the secretary of the Carnegie Corporation, the parent body entrusted with the donation of the late ironmaster's funds. Mr. Cartwright and Mr. Keppell are also of the administrative body. It is their duty to proceed to various parts of the United States and Canada and meet with administrative groups of officials entrusted with the functioning of the educational institutions coming within scope of the Carnegie foundation.

Mr. Keppell rather scouted the idea contained in yesterday's paper, through an interview with Dr. J. M. Palmer, of Sackville, that the visit of the Carnegie officials was to make a new set of proposals concerning a more limited amalgamation of Maritime colleges, since Acadia, Saint Francis Xavier and others were opposed to the larger scheme. He reiterated that the visit of the Carnegie officials had no definite plan in view, they were simply to let the representatives of the conference—that is the local educationalists—do the talking.

The amount of money left by Andrew Carnegie for educational purposes in Canada and other British colonies was \$10,000,000. The Canadian and British colonial bequest was really an afterthought of the late Scottish-American philanthropist and was bequeathed only a short time before his death. That the matter of an amalgamated Maritime university was still alive seemed evident to the American officials passing through today. The Carnegie offer remained open but of course it was up to Maritime Provincial educationalists to make the plans and submit them. Dr. Larned, who it was expected, would visit the Halifax and Sackville conferences as representing the President of the Carnegie Corporation will not be present, being at present in Europe.
