RAIL SHARES LEAD
IN UPWARD MOVE

American Smelting Reaches
New High Level—Prices
Steady in Montreal.

New York, July 18.—Railroad shares assumed the leadership of a broad upward movement at the opening of today's stock market. St. Paul preferred and St. Louis Southwestern preferred each opened about a point higher, while Missouri Pacific moved up to a new high of 125 1/2. Coppers also were in good demand, American smelting touching a new peak price in the first few minutes of trading.

Trading Light in Montreal.

Montreal, July 18.—Trading was light and prices steady at the opening of the Montreal Stock Exchange this morning. Canadian industrial alcohol was the most active stock and came out unchanged at 31. A fair demand was made for Brazilian, that stock coming with an overnight gain of 1/4 to 1/2. Dominion Canners was an exception to the general trend, suffering a loss of 1/4 to 3/8. The balance of the narrow list showed little change from the previous day's closing prices.

New York, July 18.—The outstanding

feature yesterday was a recovery

after being rather heavily sold in the

morning trading. The overnight news

was not of any particular importance.

Perhaps the reason for the recovery

of grain products on the application

of some ten states west of the Mississippi

will have a sobering effect on the rails,

but on the other hand there is a de-

mand for coal. Of course the latter

may be explained by the double

holidays coming in the week for which

the market is reported. The market

generally, however, would continue to

advance with some of the rails leading.

Interest switches from stock to stock

and even in a weak market the con-

structive interests can find some stock

which will advance. For example, the

Standard Oil of Indiana is a stock

which developed a great deal of

interest. Some higher grade rails

showed a much improved tone largely as

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CANADIAN BOXERS
WIN DECISIVELY

Henning and Black Force
Opponents to Quit in
Second Round.

Paris, July 17.—(Canadian Press

cable)—Olympic boxing events yester-

day added to the honors already

achieved by Canada in that department

of athletics. Harry Henning and Les-

lie Black, both of Toronto, were given

decisions over their opponents in the

middleweight contests.

Henning boxed Jensen of Norway

and in the opening round used the

upright with such telling effect that

Jensen began holding on and was

warned twice. The Canadian continued

the upping treatment in the second

round until the Norwegian decided

he had had enough and gave up the

struggle with his face bleeding

profusely.

In the battle between Black and

Lefkowitz of the United States, the

American took the offensive from the

start and reached the Canadian in

rights and lefts. Apparently, how-

ever, Black had not got properly going

in the first round for in the second

round he went after his opponent ham-

mer and tongs and landed twelve

times. He had Lefkowitz all but out

in the second, but the latter held on

until the towel was thrown into the

ring. Black gave his opponent the

toughest session that any of the Cana-

dians has given to an opponent so far.

Olympic Swimming Pool, Les Tou-

relles, France, July 18.—The United

States swimming team today won the

women's 400-metre relay, breaking the

world's record for the distance by

negotiating the 400-metres in four min-

utes 38.4 seconds.

Paris, July 18.—Johnny Weissmuller,

Illinois A. C. today won the final of

the Olympic 400-metre free-style swim-

ming with Andrew Charlton of Australia,

supposedly his strongest rival, third,

and Arne Borg of Sweden second.

Weissmuller's time of five minutes 41.3

seconds broke the Olympic record, which

was far behind Arne Borg's world

mark of 4 minutes 40 seconds, which,

however, has not yet been officially

ratified.

After leaving school he was employed


at any kind of work that he could
