China as a belligerent must be considered, and she demands that necessary steps be taken to provide for that. China is determined to have interpreted clearly Article 21 of the Covenant of the League, laying down the untenable doctrine of so-called reginoal understandings, which is not only a direct challenge to China's transfer internations.
