INSURGENTS TAKE TOWN FROM THE ITALIANS

Capture of Avlona by Albanians is Reported — Garrison Reported Captured.

Belgrade, June 29.—A report that the Albanian city of Avlona has been captured by the Italians by Albanian insurgents has been received by the newspaper Drava from Ussub, southern Serbia. The report adds that the entire Italian garrison was taken with the town. It says the Albanians carried Avlona by storm after desperate fighting with the Italians.

Rome, June 29.—The anarchists who fled from Avlona are trying to stir up trouble in other parts of the province. There have been disturbances at Pesaro, Jesi, Porto Fabiano and Civita Nova. In Romagna there have been attempts to start strikes in various towns.

Despatches from Terzi, Perugia, say that four persons were killed and nine wounded in disturbances there.

Rome, June 30.—A general strike was proclaimed on Monday night, effective yesterday except in the case of railways. The tram service suspended and many of the factories and workshops were closed. This, however, was largely due to the celebration of the Feast of St. Peter.

Fredericton, N. B., June 30.—It was announced at this morning's session of the Educational Institute of New Brunswick that a convention of school trustees would be held in the province soon. The first matter to come before the twenty-four nominated the ten elected were Dr. B. C. Foster and A. S. McFarlane, Fredericton; Dr. H. S. Bridges, St. John; G. C. Oulton, Moncton; P. A. Dixon, Sussex; D. W. Wallace, Woodstock; G. P. Harrison, Chatham; W. J. S. Myles, St. John; Miss Beattie M. Fraser, Grand Falls; Miss Louise M. Scott, Fredericton Junction.

The text book committee is composed of Dr. H. S. Bridges, W. J. S. Myles and J. Frank Owens, St. John; G. C. Oulton, Moncton; H. H. Hagerman and A. S. McFarlane, Fredericton and Miss Caldwell, Miss Sallie Thomson was elected representative of the institute on the Senate of the U. N. B.

SENATE ACTION

Ottawa, June 30.—The Senate was in session both afternoon and evening yesterday. The shipbuilding bill received a third reading. The income tax bill and the special war revenue bill were adopted without amendment. Third reading was given the franchise act, wheat board bill and the act conferring certain powers upon the railway commission in respect to the local situation. The Senate adjourned until 11 o'clock today.

BREWERIES AND SUGAR ACTIVE IN MONTREAL MARKET

Montreal, June 30.—There was a great deal of trading in breweries on the local exchange this morning, when many excited bidders were anxious to secure it at sixty and during the first hour the rush of trade was unprecedented. Atlantic Sugar, which also had a sensational rise yesterday, started at 1.88 and advanced to 1.86 when the buying slackened and attention was given once more to Breweries. Paper stocks were quiet but held firm around recent levels.

CORN AND OATS.

Chicago, June 30.—Unsettledness in regard to possible development of black rust in the spring wheat belt tended today to lift prices for other grain, including corn. After opening unchanged to 1/2 lower with July \$1.75, to \$1.76, and September \$1.70, to \$1.71, the corn market scored material gains all around.

Oats were firmer with corn. Opening prices which ranged from 1/2 declined to 1/2 advance, including September, to \$1.75, were followed by a general upturn.

Strength in grain and hogs gave steadiness to provisions.

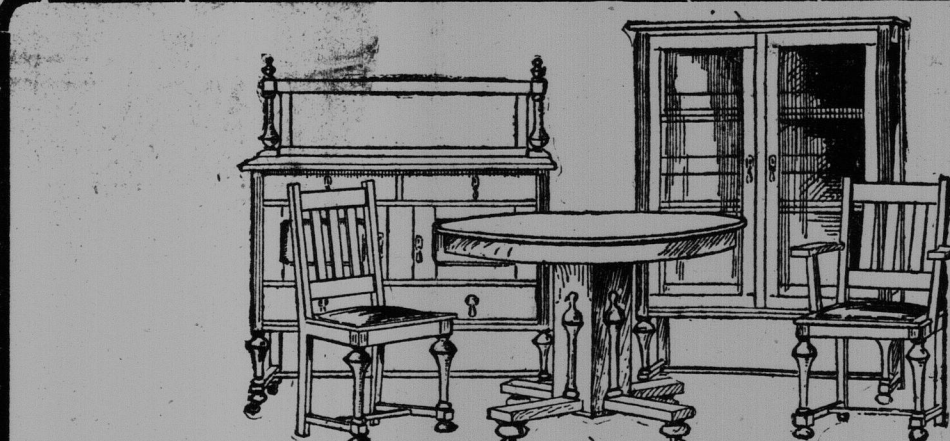

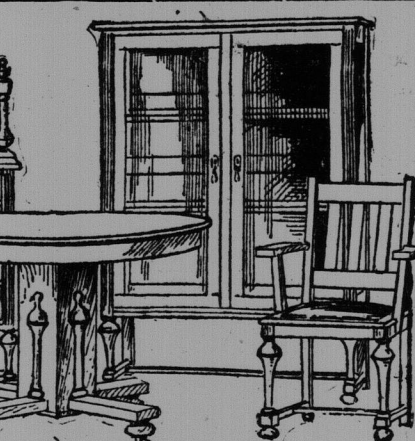

New York, June 30.—Evelyn Nesbit declares that her husband, Jack Clifford, has cost her more than \$100,000. She made the charge after she had read a published statement attacking her, made by her former dancing and marital partner, which he issued from their camp at Upper Chateaugay Lake, N. Y. Last week Miss Nesbit filed a counter claim for divorce, and named Ann Luther and Juanita Hansen, moving picture actresses, as co-defendants.
