Chicago, June 30—Uneasiness in regard to possible development of black rust in the spring wheat belt tended today to lift prices for other grain, including corn. After opening unchanged to 3/4 lower with July \$1.75% to \$1.76, and september \$1.70½ to \$1.71, the corn market scored material gains al around.

Oats were firmer with corn. Opening prices which ranged from 1/6 declined to 5/8 advance, including September at 87 to 87%, were followed by a general upturn.
