Racing Men Expelled.
New York, Dec. 3.—The American Trotting Association voted to expel three members for violation of rules. Richard Squires and Belcher Squires of Hartford (Conn.), two of those expelled, were charged with having-dyed black the mare Edna L. and entered her in a 218 class race at Windsor, Ont., although she held a 2:09 1/4 record. F. E. Kearney, of Warren (Penn.), was charged with having entered the mare Edna L. in national association meetings under the name of "Nettie B."

Chicago, Dec. 3.—"Emaline Dillon," a racing mare that has been raced under the name of "Nettie B." and its owner, E. Holliday, of San Jose (Cal.), were expelled from the American Trotting Association Circuit by the board of appeals today. The mare, according to W. I. Jams, of Terra Haute (Ind.), president of the association, participated in any race last season under the fictitious name of "Nettie B."

SHOTS AND KNIFE PLAY IN MONTREAL CAFE; FIVE HURT

Trouble Starts Between Italians on one Hand and Soldier and Sister on Other—Police Join In

Montreal, Dec. 4.—A shooting and knife fray on the stairway of a cafe in St. Catherine street east at a 10 o'clock this morning resulted in five men being taken to hospital, four in a serious condition. One of two constables taken to the institution are in danger of dying. The injured are: Constable Ernest Boucher, stabbed in left lung and may die; Remi Ruskin, chauffeur, shot in groin and in grave condition; Joseph Barbieri, Italian, broken nose, cut eye and sprained ankle; Corporal Marchal, who was able to go home with slight wounds in mouth. It appears that Marchal and his sister were in the cafe and got into an altercation with Barbieri and some other Italian there. Barbieri had known Marchal's sister previously. The quarrel continued on the stairway, and it is said that the Italians, in following Marchal and his sister, assaulted them, leading to a row in which the Italians used knives and the soldier his stick. Constables Boucher and Penticost, who were on their beat nearby, heard shouts and rushed to the scene. In the fight on the stairway both were stabbed, and Ruskin, who had become involved in the disturbance, was shot when the constables tried to defend themselves with their revolvers.

SOUGHT TO USE PAPERS TO STOP MANUFACTURE OF MUNITIONS IN STATES
Evidence of Organization Comes Out Before Senate Investigating Committee

Washington, Dec. 4.—Organization in 1915 of a \$200,000 advertising campaign by which it was hoped to stop the manufacture of munitions for the Allies in the United States was admitted by Louis N. Hammerling, president of the American Association of Foreign Language Newspapers, in testifying yesterday before the senate committee investigating activities of brewers and German propagandists.

Edward A. Hamely, recent owner of the New York Evening Mail, and Dr. Heinrich F. Albert, a German propagandist, were connected with the campaign by the witness, who declared that the money for the insertion of the advertising in practically all of the 619 newspapers of the association of which he is president was contributed largely by Rumley.
