



## **Babe and Brother Die Despite Heroic** Efforts of Elder Boy — Grim Tragedy in Maine


Calais, Oct. 17—News of the saddest happening of the year hereabouts comes in the report of a tragedy which occurr-ed at North Perry on Thursday, in which two young children of Mr. and Mrs. Fred Eaton lost their lives in a fire which consumed their home, a fair-sized frame dwelling situated a short igtance from the Murchie mill. According to William Flags, who was caused by the bursting of the chimney which was located in the centre of the building while the accumulated soot in the chimney was burning.
