It is announced that the National Council of Women has got behind with its schedule of business because there has been too much talking. Women talking too much? What an unkind suggestion.

It is announced that from 60 to 80 per cent of the seeding is done along the line of the Canadian Northern Railway in Western Canada, and that many districts report the wheat all in. They move quickly in the west.

The woman's suffrage bill has been defeated in the British House of Commons. The Irish Nationalists voted solidly against it. If they had been divided on the question the bill would either have been adopted or defeated by a very narrow majority. The fact that 219 votes were registered in its favor shows that the day of its triumph is merely postponed.

The delegation which left last night for Ottawa is a strong one, and thoroughly well informed regarding the needs of this port. It will no-doubt have the support of a representative of the Canadian Pacific Railway Company, and the representatives of the city of Montreal, whose port is also suffering from congestion, should be in sympathy with the claims of this port, which must handle in winter the business which goes to Montreal in summer.

Mr. Bryan was annoyed by facetious remarks made by English journals regarding his temperance principles and his refusal to serve liquor at public dinners where he is the host, he may be tempted to describe the average Englishman as he was described by one of the characters in Lorna Doone, when an Italian woman asserted that with the English it was "beer" first, last and all the time. This charge he indignantly repudiated in the following words: "Only a pint at breakfast time, and a pint and a half at eleven o'clock, and a quart or so at dinner. And then no more till the afternoon; and half a gallon at supper time. No one can object to that."

The Standard has discovered that the visit of Sir Wilfrid Laurier to Toronto took all the fight out of him and his followers in relation to the naval bill. The answer to the Standard's editorial, however, is found in the Standard's news columns, where it is declared that the Liberals will continue to oppose the naval bill until closure is applied, and then urge the senate to throw out the bill. Evidently Sir Wilfrid did not hear anything in Toronto to discourage him in his efforts to force the government to submit the naval question to the people. On the contrary the splendid reception given him in the hot bed of Toryism in Ontario is the very thing that would encourage him and his supporters to fight the people's battle to the end.

Fort William, May 6.—According to figures issued by the Dominion Grain Commission, more than 20,000,000 bushels of grain have been shipped by water from the twin cities since the opening of navigation, and at present there are more than 21,000,000 bushels in the elevators. Between 300 and 400 cars are arriving daily. Grain men, however, do not fear a blockade, and believe that all the grain will be out before this year's crop begins to flow in.

PUBLIC NOTICE
The City of Saint John has by resolution of the Council thereof, passed on the twenty-eighth day of April, A.D. 1913, the following resolution which was unanimously adopted:
"Resolved, that the paving of that portion of Garden street from Hazen street to Coburg street is necessary and that in the public interest such paving should be done; and further:
"Resolved, that the Common Clerk publish a notice of the passing of this resolution and also estimate of approximate cost per lineal foot of such paving, as required under Section 1, Sub-section (b) of the Act of Assembly 7 Edward 7, Chapter 87, Intituled 'An Act relating to the paving of Streets in the City of Saint John.'
And in accordance with the provisions of Section 1 (b) of the Act 7 Edward 7, Chapter 87, notice is also hereby given that it is estimated that the approximate cost per lineal foot of such paving is \$10.00, and that the owners of the rateable land fronting on the sidewalks of said street (or, portion of street) proposed to be paved, will be assessed and compelled to pay for the one-half of the cost of so paving such street, viz: \$2.50 per lineal foot approximately for each owner's frontage on said street; provided always that the said City will itself pay the cost of so paving the portions of the street that includes such portions as cross another street.
And notice is also hereby given that after publication of this notice as required by the said Act the City may proceed to
