**MILL HANDS FREE
WITH THE MONEY**

Families Spend \$400 or \$500
on Week's Holidays

DRAW OUT HALF MILLION

Continental Trips Taken by Many
When Lancashire Works Shut
Down - Workers Take Pride
in Coming Home Broke

(Times' Special Correspondence)

London, Aug. 19.—If two or three members of even a moderately well-to-do colonial family habitually spent between \$400 and \$500 on a week's holiday, their acquaintances would be likely to think them extravagant. Yet, according to an official of a friendly society in the north with whom the writer talked yesterday, it is quite a common thing for two or three mill-hands in Lancashire belonging to the same family to draw that sum at the beginning of a week's holiday and come back at the end of it with scarcely a copper among them.

Among the mill-hands of Lancashire, which is the great cotton-manufacturing district—holiday-making and particularly holiday spending amount to a craze. The mills are closed for a week in August—it is this period that is known as the "wakes," a phrase made famous by St. Louis Highways in Switzerland play—and during this time it seems to be the ambition of the workers to spend as much of their hard-earned savings as possible in "seeing sights" and engaging in other amusements. During the last year, the mills have been working overtime and, consequently, the workers have laid up even more money than usual for their annual "bust."

"It is estimated," said my informant, "that \$850,000 has been paid out by saving clubs in Blackburn alone, and more than \$200,000 in Preston. Besides this, thousands of pounds have been withdrawn from savings banks, and the Preston Co-operative Society Bank has paid out \$88,000, of which nearly \$14,000 went to the workers in one mill."

"Some of the families of the better-paid workers, in which two or more members of the family work in the mills, have drawn as much as \$400 and \$500 for the holidays, all of which will be spent during the week."

During this week, when practically the whole population of these towns is on holiday, its denizens are scattered from the South-Highlands to Switzerland, to continental trips, in fact, are in high favor with the cotton-workers and my informant declared that they would have left Blackburn alone on long-distance excursions.

"Thousands of them," he added, "will be at Blackpool and thousands more in the Isle of Man, where they drive about in brakes most of the day and dance for hours at night. They rather take a pride in coming home 'spend' on, as they term it, and a lot of them would be stranded at the end of the week if they had not taken return tickets."

He added that the yearning for holidays among the mill-hands is so strong that in hard times families have been known to pawn or even sell their furniture in order to get a spell away from home.

MORNING LOCALS
