A GREAT UNIVERSITY.
Chicago, March 12.—At the One Hundred Thirty-second Convocation of the University of Chicago on March 18, the following degrees will be conferred by President Ernest DeWitt Burton: In the College of Arts, Literature, and Science, 70 Bachelor's degrees; in the School of Commerce and Administration, 17; in the School of Social Service Administration, 2; and in the College of Education, 14—a total of 103. In the Divinity School there will be four candidates for the degree of Master of Arts; four for that of Bachelor of Divinity; and one for that of Doctor of Philosophy, a total of nine. In the Law School four will receive the degree of Bachelor of Laws and eight that of Doctor of Law (J. D.), a total of twelve. In the Graduate School of Arts, Lit.

Hutchinson. G. A. Thompson and W. A. Nickerson represented the congregation. Mr. Spencer's resignation was accepted with regret, to take effect on March 31. Mr. Townsend was named interim moderator of St. Matthew's church and was instructed to declare the pulpit vacant on the first Sunday in April. Mr. Spencer will act as supply minister at Montague, P. E. I., during the summer, and afterwards is expected to retire.

Almost every night during this year there have been men between the ages of 20 and 65 years, calling at police headquarters seeking protection for a night, stating that they were without funds to obtain lodging in the city. These men were placed in the cells in the basement of the building and while their bed is on the soft side of a plank bench in the cells, they seem contented to be within doors from the cold or storm. There was only one man seeking protection last night, and he brought the grand total up to 208 since Jan. 1. During January central station housed 109 protectionists, in February, 78, and in March, to date, 21.

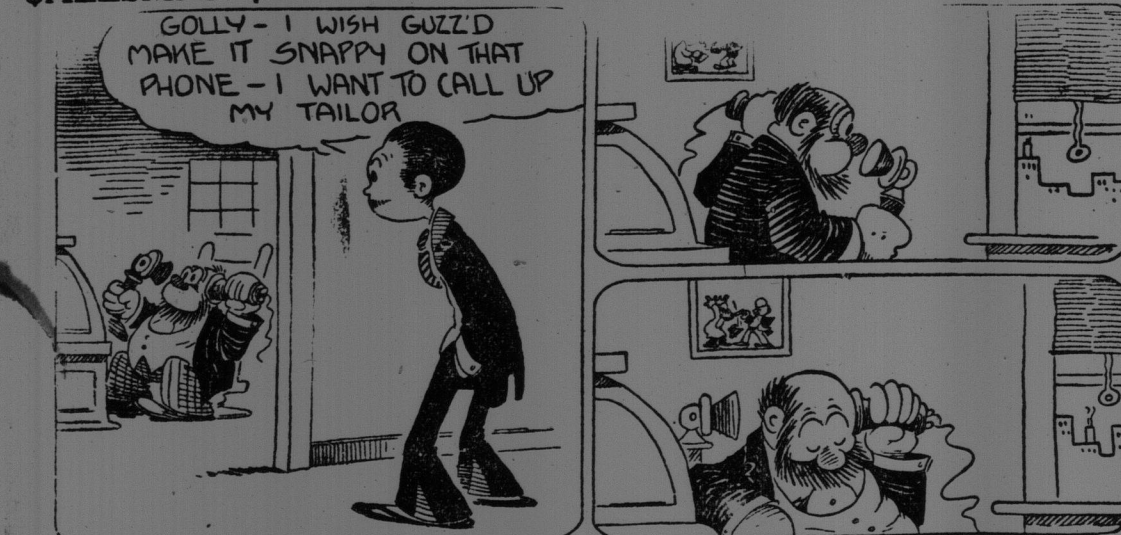

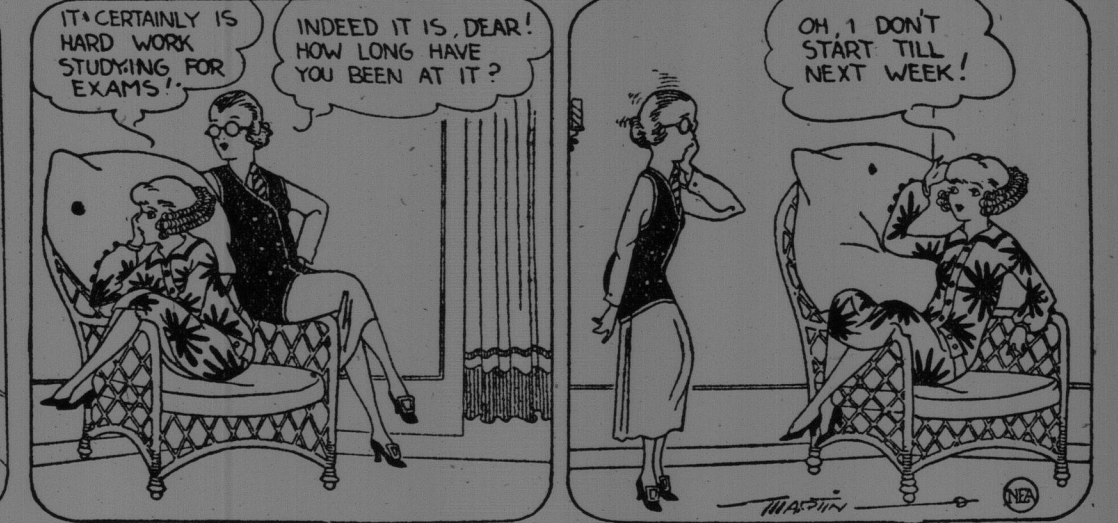

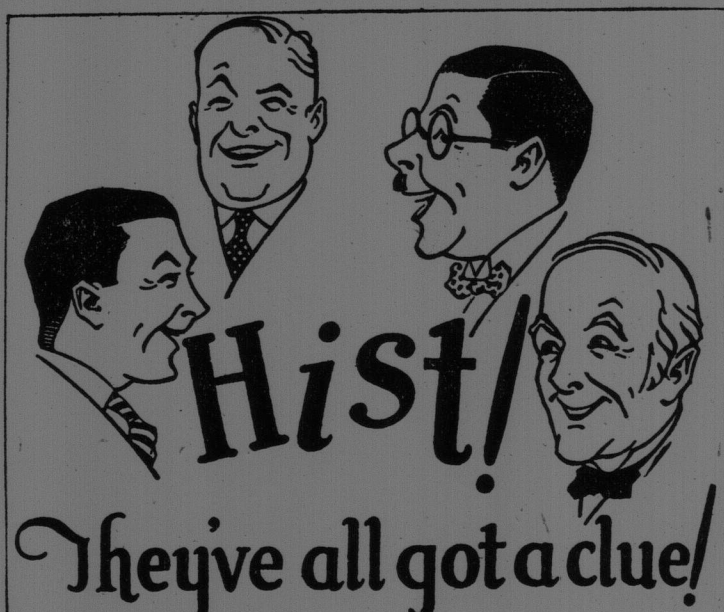
