A SENSATIONAL MOVE.

Dreyfus' Counsel has Appealed to the Kaiser and King Humbert.

Rennes, Sept. 6.—Maitre Labori telegraphed personal appeals to Emperor William and King Humbert to grant permission to Col. Schwartzkoppen and Panizzardi, military attaches at Paris in 1894, to come to Rennes to testify at the trial of Capt. Dreyfus. The appeals were couched in eloquent terms, invoking the assistance of their majesties in the name of justice and humanity.

The demand of M. Labori came like a thunderbolt. The step is fraught with momentous consequences, as it affords Emperor William an opportunity again to assume his favorite role, of arbiter of destinies of the world. No one would be surprised if Col. Schwartzkoppen, in the name of the Kaiser, should make a declaration that would practically decide the result of the trial. Both Schwartzkoppen and Panizzardi must consult their respective sovereigns before starting.

At the trial yesterday, among other witnesses, Gen. Zurlinden spoke a few words, respecting the general staff's belief in Major Esterhazy. M. Dreyfus asked Gen. Roger his opinion of Major Esterhazy. "I have an absolute conviction," replied Gen. Roger, "that Major Esterhazy is a stranger to treason."

M. Dreyfus, a reporter for the Temps testified that he saw Major Esterhazy in London, and that the latter confessed that he was the author of the bordereaux. Dreyfus was the second reporter to testify to this effect.

The other, Georges Russel, first testified that the Matin sent him to London on five occasions to interview Major Esterhazy. Esterhazy first declared that he was not the author of the bordereaux, though the witness did not believe him. Esterhazy complained bitterly of the generals, who, he said, had thrown him overboard, adding that there was nothing left for him but to blow out his brains.

Finally, while walking in Piccadilly, Major Esterhazy said to the witness, "Well, Ribot (the witness's name) I am going to tell you what nobody knows. I am the author of the bordereaux."

At the trial, at the request of an associate counsel, Dreyfus, whom Sandherr said they wanted to catch, did not hesitate to do what I was asked.
