During her long cruise in the Channel the maximum power de yeloped was 26,497 indicated horsepow er, which exceeds that of any warship sfloat and is only excelled by the two new Cunarders. In the first test, 30 hours steaming at 5,000 indicated horsepower, the cruiser made 14.34 knots, using four and a half tons of ccal per hour, and in the next 44 hours steaming, with 18,000 horsepower, she node 21 knots with 150 tons of coal

Minor News of the Day in Different Parts of the States

Montgomery, Ala., Dec. 4 .-- Representative Pitt, one of the foremost lawyers in the assembly, introduced a bill which in effect licenses a man to kill the despoiler of his female relatives.

Denver, Colo., Dec. 4 .-- Judge Lefure has given a decision in the district court admitting Roentgen rays photographs as secondary evidence may be shown to the jury illustrating the testimony of experts. The decision was given in the trial of the suit of James Smith against Dr. W. W. Grant, for alleged malpractice in the treatment of a fractured hip.
