The Local "Opposition."

The News, Mr. Willis' paper, says: - The Advance concedes that Northumberland members will have much to say about the completion of the Government.

We hope an effort will be made by the new House of Assembly to assist the new Government, when completed, in effecting reforms which past experience will have suggested.

The present Provincial Secretary was a consistent and independent advocate of economy and caution in the matter of Immigration, while Mr. Willis and his associates in the Government - backed, it is true, by a large majority in Assembly and encouraged by false promises of Sir John A. Macdonald's Dominion Government - entered upon and carried out the policy which caused so large a measure of dissatisfaction.

The strong personal interest which Mr. Willis took in carrying out the Immigration policy is proved by the fact that he received allowances from the public treasury for travel and other services connected with some of the Colonies founded by the Government of which he was a member, and many of his friends recollect the eagerness with which he boarded the *Castalia*, even before she was in St. John.

It is displaying so absorbing an interest in the Railway and Immigration policies of the late New Brunswick Government, Mr. Willis would do well to consider the good faith and under a sense of duty. Like the majority of the people of the Province, at that time he, perhaps, believed that he was doing right, but it is scarcely fair to say nothing of what is honorable in politics - for him, apparently only because he chooses to aspire to the leadership of the Opposition, to bring across which he, himself, was as anxious as any other member of the Government.

But, Mr. Willis may say he does not propose to say anything against "the past policy of the Government and its demerits." To be sure, he may say that. Again, Mr. Willis may not wish any thing said about the Chatham Branch Railway, but he may cause the Gloucester Seizures matter to be resurrected for Opposition service. Well, some members will be sure to recollect the satisfactory settlement of the whole matter and that Mr. Willis and a large majority of the Assembly voted to that effect and sustained the Government of which Mr. Willis was a member. It will be recollected, also, that at the time, there was considerable comment over the fact that Mr. Willis prepared his resignation as a member of the Government. That he did not tender it he must have believed the Government blameless.

Perhaps, however, the Opposition, under Mr. Willis' leadership, will not bring up the Gloucester Seizures matter, but they may exume that question of Provincial metaphysical finance in reference to the discrepancy between "the Balance in the People's Bank to the credit of the Receiver General on 24th Feb. '76 and that to the credit of all depositors on the following day." Mr. Willis, as a member of the Government at that time will, however, know exactly how to re-explain the intricacies of Warrant Account and Check Account and Warrant Balance and Check Balance and as the Government, after Mr. Willis left it, recommended that mode of bringing down the matter, he will find in making any headway in that direction for himself or his followers.

What it really is, therefore, that

Mr. Willis can bring against the Government, that will not, at the same time, be equally telling against himself, we are at a loss to know, and if he actually has an Opposition party which thinks it can make capital out of the Chatham Branch subjects to which we have alluded, the new House will seem to have been elected in vain.

There will, no doubt, be an Opposition, but it is to be hoped that it will find its work in something more intelligent and, at the same time, profitable to the country than raising discussions on subjects already disposed of. There is a feeling abroad that our Educational System is being worked in such a manner as to absorb a larger share of Provincial money than should be applied upon it. The money spent every year is, perhaps, too small for the maintenance of a broad and efficient system, but it is also largely out of proportion with the total amount of the Provincial Revenue, in view of the requirements of the other public services.

The Law is being administered with a view of not only placing a practical education within the reach of the children of the land, but that a very large sum is annually absorbed by the higher schools of the Cities and Towns, and from which only a small proportion even of the children within reach of them, receive benefit. This, certainly, has the appearance of making provision for public expense for a particular class of children, for it is quite well known that when those of the bulk of our population have spent a sufficient time at school to qualify them for pursuing studies in the higher branches, their parents require their assistance in earning a livelihood and, thus, in nine cases out of ten, the poor man's child must be sent to the workhouse.

It is to be hoped that the Government will earnestly undertake the task of bringing our School System within the circumstances of the Province to which it will save the Opposition the trouble of getting into a position to do so, for we believe the people entertain an increasing and reasonable belief that if we had less of Classics and other higher educational accomplishments in our schools, the Common Schools and more of "Common School Education" it would be as good for the children and much better for the Province and the local tax payers.

It will also be the duty of the Opposition to find fault if the Government fails to improve the system of rendering the Public Accounts; its attention may also be devoted to making the Queen's Printer more efficient; and to the improvement of our Road System. If, however, the Government within the limits of these matters within a reasonable time with Mr. Willis and his Opposition should be found employing themselves in the useless task of promoting debates on issues that have been already settled, and with which the present House has really nothing to do, we predict a successful four years' career for the Fraser-Willis Administration, notwithstanding "the past policy of the Government and its demerits."

Taxes on the Farmer.

The following extract from a speech delivered in the U. S. Congress in support of Mr. Wood's Bill shows how the farmer in the United States is taxed.

"The farmer in the United States is taxed on his agricultural pursuits, has neither the time nor opportunity to investigate the influence of the tariff tax on his household expenses; it is a fact, however, that every article he uses is either directly subjected to a tariff or derived from the tariff. Let us enumerate these burdens: - The farmer's house in the West, where lumber is scarce, pays either direct or indirect tax of 40 per centum on the lumber his house is built of; a tax of 35 per centum on the paint it is painted with; of 99 per centum on his window glass; of 35 per centum on the screws; of 30 per centum on the door locks; of 35 to 40 per centum on the hinges; of 35 to 70 per centum on the wall paper; of 60 to 70 per centum on his carpet; of 40 per centum on his crockery; of 38 per centum on his iron hollow ware; of 35 per centum on his cutlery; 40 per centum on his glassware; of 35 per centum to 40 per centum on the linen he uses in his household; of 51 per centum on the common Castile soap he uses; 48 per centum on his starch. When he goes into his stable, barn or workshop, he finds that he pays 35 per centum on the iron he uses; 53 per centum on the nails he uses; 40 per centum on the files and rasps he may use; 47 per centum on the buck saw; 49 per centum on cross-cut saw; 38 per centum on the hand-saw; and 35 per centum on any sheet iron he may require. On his medicines he pays 20 per centum; on quinine pills he swallows 50 per centum; on boric pills 40 per centum; and 40 per centum on any medical preparations. The female portion of his household cannot even go into a store without paying a tax of 20 per centum on the articles required to quiet their excited nerves. On his sugar he pays a tax of at least 60 per centum. As for the clothing he and his family uses, let me enumerate the tax separately: - On his wool he pays from 60 to 80 per centum; on his fur hat from 45 to 60 per centum; on his suit of woollen clothes some 55 per centum; on the leather for his boots and shoes 25 per centum; on his hosiery 35 per centum; on his wife's and daughter's common alpaca dress he pays 65 to 70 per centum; on good thread 70 per centum; and on needles 35 per centum."

Those who argue in favor of a retaliatory tariff for the Dominion would have our farmers labor under the same disabilities as those of the United States. What they promise in return is the erection of factories and workshops which will employ our people and make the capitalists still more wealthy. They conveniently forget to remind the people that any very small percentage of their number can be employed in manufacturing, even in the most advanced countries, and that, therefore, for themselves or their followers.

The Fishery Award.

After a good deal of unnecessary skirmishing by the politicians and press of the United States, the requisite steps have been taken by Congress to pay the \$5,500,000 secured to Canada by the Award of the Halifax Fishery Commission. This sum is creditable to the leading statesmen of the neighboring Republic and a rebuke to the small and noisy politicians who sought to make personal and local capital out of a cheap truckling to what they deemed popular feeling in the matter. A few months ago the *St. John Telegraph*, was led, by some utterances of second-rate Congressmen and of the ever-changeful *New York Herald*, in the direction of repudiation, to heap a tirade of abuse upon the American people generally, and we entered a protest, at the time, against its haste and bad temper, which we thought undeserved. It is gratifying, therefore, to know that "the authorities" did not utter the sentiments of the country in reference to the award, and that the United States has shown itself, after all, ready to discharge an engagement honorably contracted, though many of its leading men may not believe it to be entirely equitable.

Methodist Conference.

The Methodist Conference of New Brunswick and P. E. I., commenced its session at St. John, N. B., on the 27th inst. Rev. John Prince, of Sussex, occupied the chair and the following officers were elected: Rev. C. H. Paisley, A. M., Woodstock; W. B. Cowperthwaite, of P. E. I., secretary.

A Missionary meeting was held in the evening. The report submitted showed that the contributions to this auxiliary from Miramichi were \$300.04. The total contributions were \$8,745.25.
