

BERLIN, Oct. 28.—A violent attack
upon Great Britain is made in a book written by Dr. Henry Oberwinder, which is just out. Were it not that the author is taken seriously by his readers the tirade might be regarded as amus-ing. The leading Conservative journal, the "Deutsche Tageszeitung," recommends all Germans to read the book attentively.

Then Carted It Away With \$10.000 in Gems.

NEW YORK, Oct. 27.—While the servants in the household of Edward Hale Graves, who lives in Scotland Road, Graves, who lives in Scotland Road, South Orange, N. J., were on the first floor of the house last evening burglars took a safe weighing 250 pounds and containing about \$10,000 worth of jewelry, rolled it to a window, dropped it out and made way with it. Despite a police guard at every road within an hour, they escaped.

Mr. Graves is a broker of No. 30 Broad street. His residence in the fashionable Montrose section of the Oranges is one of the handsomest in the community. It stands a short distance from the street, and there are

other houses adjoining and across the time ago Mr. Graves bought the safe, which the dealer assured him was absolutely burglar proof. He said it would take a burglar hours to make a scratch on the lock. Mr. Graves himself said that it did look formidable and that sametimes even he had trouble in gat sometimes even he had trouble in get-ting the door open. It was kept in the bedroom on the second floor, and with perfect confidence Mrs. Graves deposited in it much of her jewelry, to which her husband added many important

papers.

Mr. and Mrs. Graves were in this city yesterday and went home soon after seven o'clock. It is supposed that the robbery was committed some time after six o'clock, as it could scarcely have been done in the daytime. After six o'clock all the servants were down

on the first floor. When Mr. and Mrs. Graves reached home and went to dress for dinner they found a window open in Mrs. Graves' room, and as the lights were turned on, it was seen that there were muddy footprints all over the room. The foot tracks led from the window to a dresser, the drawers of which had been broken open. There was nothing taken from them, however. Then the tracks ran to the corner

where the safe had stood. The safe was heavy enough to tax the energies of a strong man who tried to carry it even a short distance, and it is assumed that there were two men. The safe had been rolled or carried across the room and then dropped out of the window. A deep hole in the ground shows where it fell. They had a horse and wagon waiting.
