ST. PETERSBURG, Nov. 15.—The proletariat of St. Petersburg has summoned a general political strike beginning today at noon. This action was decided upon late last night by the workers' strike committee.

ST. PETERSBURG, Nov. 15.—The latest reports from Vladivostok intimate that the rioting has not yet been suppressed. Both the sailors and fortress artillery participated in the outbreak.
