REV. J. K. FRASER RECEIVES DEGREE OF D. D.

ST. JOHN GIRL TELLS OF WORK IN HONOLULU

Miss Elizabeth Colwell Returns After Six Years in the Pacific, to Visit Parents in This City.

Miss Elizabeth Colwell, who has spent the last six years in Honolulu, talked to the Star this morning about her work there. Miss Colwell has returned to St. John to spend a year's vacation with her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Wm. H. Colwell, Paradise Row.

For the past half dozen years she has been connected with the Kawaioho Seminary for girls of white, Hawaiian and other nationalities. The school was founded by the Park St. Congregational Church of Boston and is now under the control of the Hawaiian Evangelical Association.

Mission work was first started in Honolulu in 1818 when the missionaries had to travel around the Horn in sailing vessels to get to their destination. In 1850 the islands were supposed to be fully evangelized and the American Board withdrew. At that time the Evangelical Association took over the churches and other missionary work, the seminary among them, and has since then carried on the work.

The Association is formed of the white people of the islands and the churches under their direction are now self-sustaining except for a small grant still made by the American Board.

The seminary which is a boarding institution, takes girls of all kinds, of different races and various colors and in age ranging from four years to twenty-two. The education given is both academic and industrial. It is the opinion of some of the school's supporters that the native girls are fitted only for the industrial training.

On the other hand the half bred girls are very clever and readily learn all that the curriculum includes. During the last year among the scholars were Hawaiian, Chinese, Japanese, Koreans, Portuguese, one Filipino and nearly all possible mixtures of blood.

In spite of the many differences between them the one hundred or more girls live very peaceably and happily together. English is the only language taught and frequently pupils arrive who do not know a word of English. They pick the language up very quickly when placed among the other children.

When the girls graduate from the seminary some of them become nurses. Some take up dress making and some after a course at the Normal School, of which Prof. Edward Wood, graduate of the University of McGill, is principal, become school teachers.

The main vocation, however, is marriage and the seminary teachers do all they can to find suitable husbands for the girls.

The Hawaiian girls are very attractive in appearance with satin skins of a beautiful light brown shade and are very comely, but as they grow older they usually become very corpulent.

The native dress consists of a garment resembling a Mother Hubbard wrapper. Those worn by the older women are frequently of rich material such as silk or velvet.

The social conditions in Honolulu are somewhat peculiar owing to the great mixture of races there. The pure Hawaiian stock is dying out and their place is being taken by half breeds.

The Japanese are in the ascendancy on the island as regards numbers for they constitute about two-thirds of the population. They are very clanlike and do not intermix with the natives or any other race.

Before the Chinese exclusion act was passed great numbers of Chinese were brought to the island as contract laborers on the sugar plantations. Since then they have gone into other lands and now nearly all the general farming is done by Chinamen and they own nearly all the retail stores.

The Chinamen frequently marry native girls and the children of such a union are regarded as very desirable additions to the population. They combine the softer characteristics of the natives with the sterner and more practical features of the Chinese character.

The mixture of white and natives are not placed in as high a class chiefly because the whites who mingle with the natives are not of a very high type.

The desire of the Japanese to learn English leads them to accept the most menial positions. Most of the house servants and yard boys are graduates of Japanese schools and universities and some are officers in the Imperial army.

The yard boy at the seminary was a Shinto priest.

WILL NOT CHANGE THE HARBOR BILL

Harbor Facilities Committee Will Not Ask to Have Whole Harbor Placed in Commission.

At a meeting of the harbor facilities committee held this morning, it was decided that no move should be made by the city at present to have the whole harbor placed in commission.

The bill will remain as it is, and any move to widen its scope will have to come from the government.

A delegation to meet the local government was chosen, consisting of Mayor Bullock, Ald. Frink, Ald. McCordick, Ald. Eskin, Engineer Peters and Supr. Murdoch. The delegation will meet the government tomorrow evening and discuss arrangements for the Courtenay Bay bridge, and for the replacing of the Marsh Creek bridge. They will return to the city on Friday morning.

The matter of providing grain conveyors for the berths five and six at West St. John will be left to the Dominion government and the C. P. R. to arrange between them, as the city feels that it cannot invest any more money in that way.

The Marathons and the Exmouths will be the ball teams to play on the Victoria grounds this evening.


