Through the courtesy of William Downie, a party composed of Sir Andrew, James F. Robertson, Dr. J. W. Daniel, James Manchester, Hugh Sherburne, W. H. Barnaby, H. D. McKinnon, Mr. Fraser, Jr., J. K.
