

SITUATION IN MONTREAL IS UNIQUE

City will be Without Official Administration for Three Weeks Owing to Necessity for Recount.

Montreal, April 9.—Owing to the counting of the votes cast at the municipal elections on Monday last and the necessity for a recount, the city will be without an official administration for three weeks. This information was supplied today by Ald. L. A. Lapointe, leader of the city council who alleged that a recount will take four or five days and when the returning officer is in possession of the figures he cannot make any public proclamation of the results until four more days have elapsed in order to give unsuccessful candidates an opportunity to apply for a judicial recount.

Such a judicial recount will be asked for, which means a week more before the city government can take office.

The outgoing civic administration retires today and the new mayor, controllers and aldermen should have been sworn in on Saturday.

"The board of control, or the city council cannot sit," said Ald. Lapointe, "and although Mayor Lavallee still remains nominally mayor he is but a communicating link between the old and the new and nothing he does is official. For three weeks no civic business can be transacted and the disposal of urgent civic matters will be at a standstill."

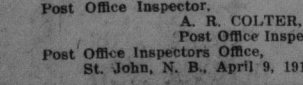

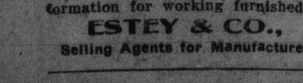

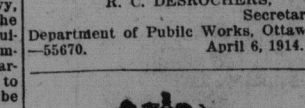

SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-WEST MINING REGULATIONS.

Under the new mining rights may be obtained for twenty years, renewable at an annual rental of \$1 an acre, or more than 160 acres may be leased to one applicant. Royalty, five cents per acre, payable to the land owner. The land must be staked out by the applicant in accordance with the provisions of the Act or sub-Agency of Dominion Lands for the district, must be made by the applicant within thirty days after the date of the application.

CLAIMS.—A person eighteen years of age or over, who is a Canadian citizen, may locate a claim of 160 acres by 160 rods, or less, in any section of the land. At least one acre must be explored on the claim each year, or paid to the Minister of the Interior. When the claim is located, the claimant must be paid to the Minister of the Interior. The claim must be made by the applicant within thirty days after the date of the application.

DEEDING.—Two leases of five miles each of a river may be located to one applicant for a term of 20 years. The fee is one mile per annum. Royalty, 25¢ per acre. The output exceeds 100,000 bushels of wheat per year.
