Horse Racing At  
The Houlton Fair

Events Were Keenly Contested and Excellent Time Was Made—New Brunswick Horses Were There.

Special to The Standard. Houlton, Me., Aug. 27.—A large crowd from all parts of Aroostook county and New Brunswick were present at the second day of the Houlton Big Fair. The trotting of the afternoon was the best ever pulled off in the eastern part of the State, every race being closely contested and horses bunched in every heat. In the 2:14 race very fast time was made by Little Anna, first quarter 32; half 1:05 1-4; three-quarter, 1:39 3-4; mile 2:12 1-4, who won the heat and race. The Canadian Aviator, who was to have been here, had engine trouble and could not reach Houlton today, but it is expected he will be on hand for Thursday and Friday.

The evening's entertainment closed with fireworks and vaudeville. The Calais band is furnishing high class music.

Thursday and Friday promise big crowds, and on Friday a matched race will be pulled off, three horses with a record of 2:12 will contest.

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Sailing Craft  
Become Popular  
Along The River

Wind-Driven Boats Coming Back as Vehicles of Pleasure on the St. John—Reminiscences of Sailing and Motor Boats.

After having a decline for several years, boating is again being taken up and along the St. John and its tributaries every afternoon and evening the reaches of the river are dotted with the white wings.

Motor boats chug up and down, yachts tack about, rowboats and canoes are seen once more and even the houseboat has reappeared after years of seclusion in some quiet creek.

At Rothesay the harbor has this year almost assumed its old-time crowded aspect. Among the yachts which come up to the wharf and are seen skimming up and down the river are the Aeolus which now has a motor engine, and is used chiefly as a ferry by its owners, Messrs. Fairweather, Frink, Cooper and Hibbard, when they desire to visit their club house on the island, Miss Mabel Thomson's sailing yacht, the Ellen, Rupert Turnbull's yawl, the Kathleen, the Clyde, owned by John Kilpatrick, the Smoke, that graceful sailboat belonging to Ralph Fowler, the Sonagetha, sailed by Miss Louise Brown, and another Indian named yacht, also from the island, and belonging to Lew Mullins.

Motor boats owned by Rothesay residents or those which are frequent visitors at Rothesay wharf are Harry Puddington's, Elmer Puddington's, Dr. Oliver Peters', A. Burton's speed boat, the Fox King, the Irene, owned by P. Starr, W. R. in some quiet creek.

It would be impossible to omit mention of the useful ferry run by Roy which goes between Rothesay and Clifton and is none other than the Fieda, formerly owned by the Messrs. Purdy and well known on the St. John River.

At Riverside William S. Allison has a very fine yawl new to the river this year, the sloop Gracie M., held in affectionate remembrance by many campers, is at Riverside, also, called by Robert Anderson.

Rowing, paddling and sailing are very popular at Fair Vale and much interest is being taken in the aquatic sports to be held at this popular summer resort on Labor Day.
