Carpentier Has Respect For Dempsey

European Champion Gives His Impression of American Fighter on His Return.

Paris, Nov. 14.—Georges Carpentier, the heavyweight champion of Europe, returned from America richer by one million francs and with a great respect for the fighting ability of Jack Dempsey, world title holder.

Carpentier, who was never boastful, even before leaving France when he had just won the title, said on his return that Dempsey was considered in America to be a "super-fighter," but that he would meet him with as much confidence as he did the British fighters, Wells and Beckett, whom he knocked out.

"The newspapers," he said, "reported Dempsey as saying he would lead me to the slaughter like an ox. I don't believe it. I have met Dempsey, who is really a very amiable gentleman. I even had one match with him which I won—but that was as golf. Dempsey's kind thought in sending me a wireless message when off Nantucket wishing us Godspeed was very gentlemanly."

The hostile remark attributed to Carpentier's manager, Decamps, at the Jersey City ball park, that Carpentier would beat the champion in two rounds, has now been modified to such expressions as "the difference in weight of 14 pounds will be a great handicap" and "the man who leads the first blow will win."

Carpentier showed only a trace of bitterness when he referred to the outcry of "fake" raised by the American press concerning his bout with Lewinsky and the hissing and jeers to which he was subjected while acting as second to Charles Ledoux, the French bantamweight, in the latter's bout in Madison Square Garden in New York. He seemed greatly amused at Decamps' reference to the ringside "sports" in evening clothes and bedecked with diamonds in Jersey City who kept exhorting Lewinsky to "kill the frog."

California is no longer to enjoy a monopoly of winter baseball. The Florida West Coast Winter League has been organized and will start its initial season November 11, with teams in Tampa, St. Petersburg, Sarasota and Tarpon Springs.

Fifteen of the most prominent women hockey players of Philadelphia are to begin an invasion of Great Britain in November. While abroad they will play the prominent county teams in England. In addition matches will be played in Scotland and it is hoped to play Oxford and Cambridge.

Major league baseball magnates desirous of making a change in their training camps next year should not overlook St. Petersburg, Fla. The authorities of that city have voted \$50,000 for the construction of a ball park and playing quarters for any major league club with which arrangements can be made.

A bunch of Pacific Coast League players under the direction of Gene Doyle of Los Angeles has started for a barnstorming tour of the Orient. A series of games has been booked in Hawaii, Japan and China.

By their lack in providing everything even suggestive of a title match, Johnny Kilbane, Johnny Wilson and Pete Herman did fair to become the most unpopular trio of champions in the records of American pugilism.

Boxing fans do not appear inclined to take seriously the report that the Dempsey-Carpenter championship bout will be staged in Havana. It's too far from Broadway, in popular opinion, to pan out profitably.

Rumors are again afloat in international circles that Montreal is to have a berth in the Pulitzer circuit next season. The addition of the Canadian city would probably mean the dropping of either Akron or Syracuse from the league.
