COMES RIGHT DOWN TO NEW PRICE LEVELS

You cannot beat the logic of it, as an old Scotch captain observed.

"I could have started days ago—but could have started on Wednesday in fact, for there is no need to close the door of this store for a minute to get ready for a sale. The price in the pocket of each guaranteed semi-ready garment is the true worth of that garment at the time of its making. No man can manipulate that price—can't shut up shop and make new tickets with a pen or pencil.

EXTREMISTS IN INDIA FORM PARLIAMENT

Their New Constitution Calls for Self-Rule by All "Legitimate Means."

MODERATES QUIT THE AGITATORS

May Ignore British Executives, Like Sinn Fein, and Name Native Ones.

Calcutta, Dec. 19.—It is significant that at the moment when the British Government has acceded to India a constitution on ultrademocratic lines, involving the enfranchisement of over 6,000,000 voters, the leaders of the Indian National Congress are proposing a new constitution for their organization which will give it at least the semblance of a true Indian parliament.

The Indian National Congress, the most powerful political organization the country possesses, was founded as long ago as 1885. Its object has been to obtain for India "by constitutional means" a status similar to that of the British self-governing dominions. Hitherto the organization has regarded the continued connection of India with Great Britain as axiomatic and its official methods have been strictly peaceful and "constitutional."

Revision in Electoral Methods.

From this new definition of aims the revised constitution of the Congress proceeds to a complete revision of electoral methods. Hitherto its constitution has been that of what used to be called in England an Exeter Hall meeting, or of a Christian Endeavor rally. From every district in India "delegates" to the number of 12,000 or 14,000 assembled, the sole restriction on their eligibility being the declaration that they represent somebody and are willing to pay a delegate's fee of \$4. The new constitution will make the district Congress committee the unit of administration in India—the Congress electoral unit. Each district committee will return to the Congress one delegate for every 100,000 of the population, and the choice delegates to the governing Congress caucus, the All-India Congress committee, will be made by the district delegates sitting in provincial colleges of delegates. For this purpose India is redivided into new Congress "provinces," fifteen in number, allegedly based on linguistic differences. Finally an effort is to be made to use Hindustani as the language of the Congress instead of English.

British Buying Off Agitators.

This new Congress constitution affords a striking example of the constructive determination which underlies the now universal and incessant political agitation throughout India. The British Government attempts year after year to buy off the "agitators" by fresh concessions. Only one concession, made by Lord Morley last year, was of any importance. It was a concession in the direction of the constitution of the legislative councils. By 1917 another concession was believed in London to be imperative, with the result that the scheme of democracy to be inaugurated by the Duke of Connaught next February was launched. Before the electoral roll for that scheme had been issued we have the Indian National Congress already reorganizing and making no secret of the fact that this time the goal is to be complete separation from the empire.

In the present instance it is clear that the latest British overture is not merely welcomed coldly. 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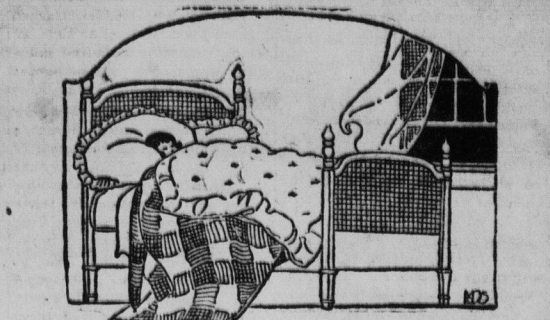

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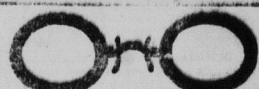
