The great drawback to the use and home manufacture of unfermented grape juice is the difficulty experienced in keeping the juice from fermenting; yet any person, understanding the underlying principles necessary for the successful manufacture of fruit, may put up an excellent quality of juice which will remain so for an indefinite length of time.
