LONDON, May 14.

Gladstone and Granville presented facts this evening to Parliament relative to the Alabama controversy, and expressed the belief that the matter would eventually be satisfactorily settled.

Gladstone, in conclusion, said that he thought he was not too sanguine in predicting that negotiations would result in a settlement which would redound to the credit of both parties.

As Gladstone took his seat, there was loud and repeated cheering from all parts of the House.

Dismail followed with thanks to the Premier for his statement. He should not seek to embarrass the Government. Whatever differences existed on other subjects all parties were united in a desire for a peaceful and honorable settlement.

The revised constitution of Switzerland failed of ratification by the people. There was a popular vote in its favor, but a majority of the Cantons was necessary, and it received but nine out of twenty-two.

The Spanish Government asks the Cortes for 40,000 fresh troops.

Paris reports state Don Carlos entered Biscay, and an engagement is expected there.

A Washington despatch states that the Governments of Great Britain and the United States have agreed to a new supplemental article to the treaty of Washington.

Michigan mining troubles not settled, and Government troops sent to the scene of the disturbance.
