Writ challenges validity of tax relief bylaw

A writ, challenging the validity of Mississauga's tax relief bylaw has been filed with the Supreme Court of Ontario,

the News learned, yesterday (Tues.).

A motion to the court, calling for a hearing on the issue Jan. 20, has been made by Freehold Land Corporation Limited and Burnhamdale Terraces Leaseholds Limited.

The motion, in the names of Roman Humeniuk, president of Freehold Land Corporation, and George Leonard Roberts, of Thornhill, president of the other company involved, says the town's Bylaw 8641 is illegal.

The bylaw was drawn up and passed by town council earlier this year following the approval of the provincial govern-

It was drafted to ease the heavy tax burdens placed on thousands of Mis sissauga property owners as a result of

reassessment program which assessed town properties at market values.

The bylaw allows for the tax increases to be spread over a five-year-period, rather than come all at once

It limits tax increases this year and next to a maximum of 10 per cent of the total, or \$50, and limits decreases in

The writ, served upon the town Dec.

23, says the bylaw is "illegal and does not conform to the Municipal Act."

It claims there was no statutory authority to allow for "arbitrarily assessing certain properties so as to produce in some cases almost double the taxes.'

Both companies represented on the writ own several properties in Mississauga

The bylaw has been used by several other municipalities as a precedent.

FAMED ORNITHOLOGIST HOSPITALIZED

ire ruins Ivor bird sanctuary

An early morning fire Tuesday destroyed the Winding Land Bird Sanctuary belonging to famed or-nithologist, Roy Ivor razing his home and killing 21 birds

Mr. Ivor, who is 91-years old and recognized as one of Canada's top bird experts, was found standing bare-foot in the snow

Within a few hours of the disastrous fire, businesman Don Inman had set up a fund to raise money for the possible rebuilding of Roy lvor's sanctury. For story, picture see page A3.

when Mississauga firefighters arrived on the scene at 6:55 a.m.

Fire gutted Mr. Ivor's single storey frame home and an adjoining building suffered smoke damage.

Mr. Ivor, whose feet may have been frost-bitten, was first spotted at the back of

his house. He was covered with a blanket against the three-degree temperature and was subsequently rushed to Mississauga Hospital to be treated for frost-bite

Roy Ivor has operated the Winding Lane Sanctuary for many years on Mississauga Rd. opposite Erindale Coll-

Ontario Humane Society wardens who were dispatched to the scene of the blaze found three birds, all owls, still alive.

The wardens brought the remaining dead birds, including an eagle and a silver pheasant, back to the Humane Society shelter to

be cremated. **ESCAPED**

Society One Humane spokesman said there was a strong possibility that many other birds had been released or had escaped from the flames before firemen arrived.

The cause of the blaze was not known at presstime.

The Mississauga Fire De-

partment sent two pumpers and 15 men to Mr. Ivor's home. When they arrived they found the house was al-

ready gutted.

The adjoining building, where many of the birds were kept, was not destroyed by fire.

However, heat or smoke could be the cause of the death of the birds found inside.

The pumper trucks had some trouble negotiating the 1400 foot entrance to the sanctuary and had to stop 100 feet away from the house as the pumpers could go no further.

Freezing temperatures ampered firemen with hampered steam from the water sometimes confused as smoke.

A fire official said 1400 feet of hose had to be laid from Mississauga Rd. to the scene of the fire to combat


