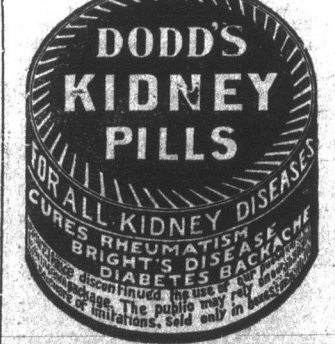
SUCCESSFUL CONCERT

DISRAELI'S LAST NOVEL.

Was Composed During the Last Year of His Life.

"Of all the pretty suburbs that still adorn our metropolis, there are few that exceed in charm Clapham Common."

These are the opening words of an unfinished novel by Benjamin Disraeli, Earl of Beaconsfield, the publication of which has been commenced by The London Times. It was found amongst the many documents left by the great statesman on his death in April, 1881. It consists of nine completed chapters and a fragment of a tenth. The book was composed during the last year of his life, and the introductory words of the tenth chapter must have been amongst the last that came from his pen. The whole, we are told, is carefully written on both sides of large note paper, with few erasures or additions.

So far as can be judged from the early chapters, the novel centres round the person of a prospective statesman, to whom, even now, some have not hesitated to attach a name. "His memory was vigorous, ready and retentive, but his chief fault was his disputatious temper, and the flow of language, which, even as a child, was ever at command to express his argument"—a descriptive sentence, which has found repetition, some would say, in a famous speech once delivered over the walnuts and the wine of Guildhall.

It was agreed, in due course, that Joseph Toplady Falconet should study for the bar—he having "left the great lawyer a line of glory as senior wrangler, and recognized as the unrivaled orator of his mimic Parliament."

A public meeting on the revival of the slave trade in the East, having been arranged, Mr. Joseph Toplady Falconet had the opportunity of making a speech, which literally electrified the audience.

The speech, indeed, became not only famous in the place where it was delivered; it was reported in the London papers, and leading articles were written, attesting its commanding eloquence, and announcing the advent of a new and powerful candidate for the public life. True it was that he subsequently appeared that there had been no revival of the slave trade in the Red Sea, but that the misapprehension had occurred from a mistake. In the telegraphic message which he subsequently suffered from a coup de soleil, or delirium tremens. But this did not signify, and made no difference whatever in the eloquence of Mr. Joseph Toplady Falconet, which he was able to accomplish.

Later, we are promised that his rapid success in Parliament will be described. Members from both sides of the House rallied round him.

Another character is a mysterious figure, of a well-known Disraelian type, who has just come to London. "I have no name," said the unknown. "His desire is 'to terminate the misery of man' by the destruction of the species." A fourth is a friend of his, a German banker and philosopher, of advanced opinions.

Curiously is only whetted by the two chapters and a half published.
