QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS. Veterinary.

OBSTRUCTED TEAT. Some time ago I felt a lump in heifer's teat, and now the kernel or lump interferes much with the milking. The lump is about 2 1/2 inches up the teat, or just below its junction with the udder, and is about the size of a grain of corn. R. W.

Ans.—Such an obstruction can only be removed by a delicate operation, and cannot be done with positive assurance of success. Unless the animal is a valuable pure-bred, we would fit her for the block, after she is past her flush. In the meantime, it may be advisable to dry up the affected quarter.

SORE SHOULDER. Mare not accustomed to work was used two days in hauling stones. She became lame in left shoulder, and a lump as large as a man's hand and two inches thick appeared. I applied liniment, and the swelling appears to be going down, but she is still lame, and drags the foot. J. H. T.

Ans.—This is what might reasonably be expected. The mare must be allowed to rest. Bathe the shoulder well three times daily with hot water, and apply a lotion made of one ounce each acetate of lead and sulphate of zinc, and one dram of carbolic acid, to a quart of water. It is probable the swelling will gradually disappear, but if a tumor forms, which is possible, it will have to be dissected out, and the wound stitched and dressed with the above lotion, until healed.

SORE SHOULDERS, ETC. 1. Mare has a very sore shoulder. It is nearly healed over, but is very tender. 2. Young horse is thin owing to his teeth. What can I do to tone and fatten him? I cannot allow him to run idle. 3. What is considered the best blood in Ayrshire cattle? Dufferin Co. T. L. H.

Ans. 1. Make a lotion composed of one ounce each sulphate of zinc and acetate of lead, and one dram carbolic acid, to a quart of water. Keep shoulder clean, and apply the lotion several times daily. If possible, give rest. 2. Get your veterinarian to attend to the teeth. He requires no drugs. Feed him with reasonable quantities of roughage, and a bed of dampened bran extra. 3. Do not continue to be to a young horse, but select a matter of...
