Following is the address read by Miss Mary Jane Gay. 4th Concession Sidney, Jan. 31, '16 Dear Mrs. Ross: We, your friends and neighbors who have assembled here tonight knowing that you have been pleased to change the position in life which you have previously occupied by taking upon yourself the responsibilities of matrimony that we know will be the cause of your taking your departure from among us, therefore we feel that we cannot allow the opportunity to pass without expressing in some small way at least our appreciation of the general kindness you have always exhibited and that too, cheerfully whenever an opportunity presented itself to assist in any and every movement undertaken to advance the social and religious interests of this community in church relation and otherwise. Perhaps we shall miss your assistance which you have freely given in connection with the choir of the church you attend. We also desire to convey to you that while this change will deprive us from the agreeable association we have found that you are not going so far away but that we shall be able to meet you, we hope frequently and that you will not be forgotten. We also hope and believe our loss will be your gain and that success and happiness will be meted out to you abundantly in your future life. We now ask you to accept these knives and forks as a small token that we perhaps when you look upon them can you to remember that you once lived in the 4th concession of Sidney and had many friends.

Mr. Ross made a suitable reply. Speeches followed. Lunch was served and all went home wishing Mr. and Mrs. Ross a long and happy wedded life.

Sir Hibbert Tupper to John Liberals.

Whitby, Feb. 23, 1916. To The Free Press from Vancouver, B.C. What has long been expected, as some seed has been sown by others, is about to take place in the person of Sir Hibbert Tupper from the ranks of the Conservative party in British Columbia his junction with their Liberal opponents. The son of one of the fathers of Confederation has definitely announced his intention of taking the platform on behalf of M. A. Macdonald, Liberal nominee against Hon. C. R. Local Legal.

His Majesty the King vs. John S. Morrison. At a sitting of the County Court at Belleville on the 24th, 25th and 26th days of October, 1915 before His Lordship Mr. Justice Aldridge the evidence in this case was taken and judgment of the trial to Ottawa was made and after argument there by Counsel judgment was reserved. In the judgment handed down on the 19th inst. the Court finds that certain lands belonging to the estate of the late Bulfinch Gross and Sheriff Morrison and lying adjacent to the River Trent were taken by His Majesty for the purposes of the "Treaty Claim." The Crown offered the sum of \$276.00 for the land taken and for all damages resulting from the expropriation. This the owners refused to accept and hence this action to determine the amount the Crown should pay the owners. A great many expert and other witnesses were called at the trial and there was a great conflict of opinion as to the value of the land and the extent to which the remaining lands of the defendants might be injuriously affected. At the trial the Crown filed an undertaking under the provisions of the Expropriation Act providing for access to the water of the river and to the highway from the remaining portions of the Defendants' property at all times, which greatly reduces the amount of actual damages done to the Defendants' property. Taking this into consideration the Court fixes the damages in addition to \$276.00 and directs the Crown to pay all the costs of the Defendants. Chas. A. Masten, K.C., Toronto, now Mr. Justice Masten of the Supreme Court of Ontario and A. Abbott, of Trenton, counsel for the Crown; E. Goss Porter, K.C., counsel for Gross and Morrison.
