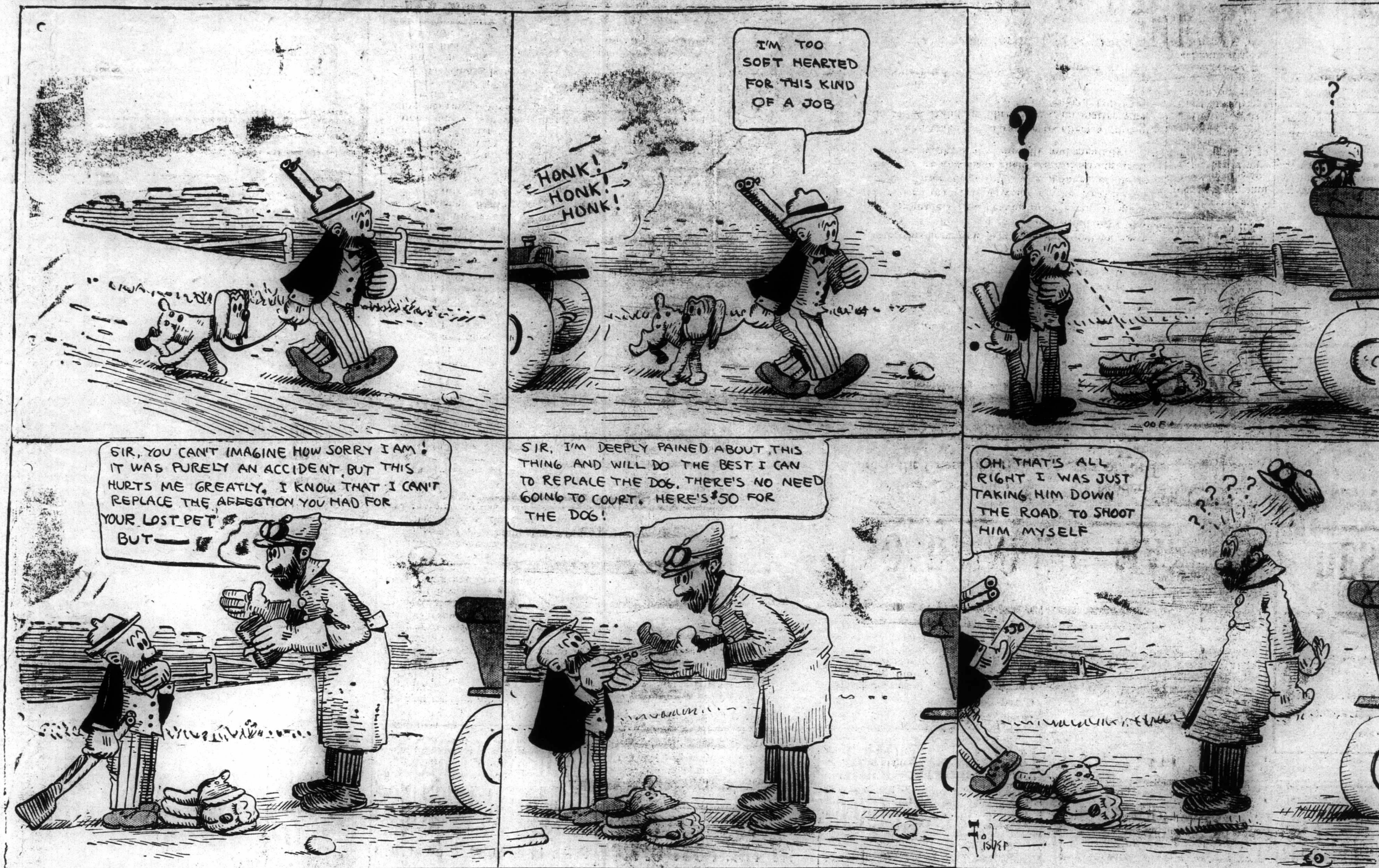

PITCHING MAY BE THE FINAL FACTOR

And How Can the Phillies Match Up McGraw's Staff?

NEW YORK, Aug. 25.—Those Phillies hang on grimly to the heels of our twice champion Giants, yet are able to make very little impression in a lead that should be secure enough for any even-gated aggregation at this stage of the race. The Quakers are playing a brand of ball that is without doubt the very best thing flashed in the parent major at this writing. But in spite of it the Giants are keeping as well to the front as they were before the Dooan dashes hit their mad spurs. With a brand of ball a shade inferior, perhaps, to that of the contenders, McGraw has been able to hold his own because of wonderful pitching.

It is this wonderful pitching that will finally break the hearts of the challengers, if the champions do not come out of the slight slump in other departments that has held them in its grip since before the last trip West. McGraw has four sterling box men who can win the great majority of games with three or four runs per contest, and that number of tallies should come easy with the speed that McGraw can muster.

Mathewson and Marquard are both enjoying most effective seasons, while Demaree has arisen to take his place with either, one of the most remarkable phenoms of modern times. Arthur Fromme has finally hit his best pace and should give a very fine account of himself from now on. If Jeff Leasure, who heretofore has been strictly a hot weather pitcher, ever gets over his inexplicable erratic tendencies, he will have to give ground to none. Jeff has been away off color all season. But that does not mean he is a poor artist. It is simply a question of getting started and he is very liable to cut loose at any time.

Weakened Bating and Glof.
The Giants did not have as fruitful a Western trip as on their first swing, but nevertheless, from a strict percentage standpoint, did as well as could be hoped by the most ardent admirers. McGraw has not complained, but it is evident that he did some figuring while in the West, as the swap of Otis Crandell for Larry McLean would indicate. For some time the Giants have slumped away painfully in their bating. Doyle, who has just had to give up because of a sore foot, is fully 60 points off his normal pace. Meyers, one of the few 300 performers this season, is nursing a split thumb. Snodgrass, Murray and Merkle, all lost their batting eyes at one time. Arthur Fletcher, of all the regulars, is the only member who has exceeded expectations with the ash. A number of the Giants who have taken a "brodie" through the reams of swatville are now devotees of St. Andrew's bonnie game. The swish of the driver and brassie as wielded by his followers has been anything but music to the ears of McGraw. He has asked his men to cut out the clubs until after the World's Series, for he thinks that the golf stroke is anything but a friend to big league batting. McGraw attributes to golf a great deal of the batting slump of his stars. The matter has not yet reached the prohibitive stage with the Little Naps, but if it comes to the question of a pennant it is a cinch that the Giants will cut the golf.

McGraw has his heart set upon winning this year's pennant. He wishes to equal the performance of his old pal Hugh Jennings, and his local rival, Frank Chance. Besides, McGraw wishes to take a real champion team around the world with the White Sox. The hearty fight that this leader is waging is well illustrated in the McLean deal.

Enquiry Started In American's Murder

Missionary Who Was Foully Done to Death by Turks.

CONSTANTINOPLE, Aug. 26.—The United States Embassy here has despatched Lewis Heck, acting vice-consul and interpreter at the United States consulate general in the Turkish capital to open an inquiry into the circumstances attending the murder of the Rev. Dr. Charles H. Holbrook, an American missionary belonging to Lynn, Massachusetts, in the South-east, Asiatic Turkey, in the middle of August. It is declared that certain facts have come into possession of the Bible House here showing that the murder was a deliberate one. According to the official version of the affair, Dr. Holbrook was sleeping in the garden, surrounding the house of an Armenian, who had been paying attentions to some Turkish woman. Two Turks belonging to the neighborhood, determined to punish the Armenian, forced their way into the garden, shot the sleeping Dr. Holbrook in mistake for the owner of the house.

The murderers have been arrested and are awaiting trial. It is expected they will be punished severely.
