**WOODSTOCK HAS LESS PEOPLE NOW**

Fewer People in City of Woodstock Than in 1914.

Woodstock, Oct. 1.—According to the assessor's roll, which was returned to the city clerk to-day, Woodstock has dropped 181 in population since last year. The total population is given as 10,084, as against 10,265 last year. There has been a substantial decrease in real assessable property, however, the decrease amounting to \$108,976. The total real property, including exemptions, is \$5,776,383. The exemptions amount to \$1,202,250, and consist of factories, churches, schools and municipal and Government property. The total income assessment is \$122,299, an increase of about \$9,000.

**Music and Drama**

The musical numbers are very pleasing and varied, and include "Sheltering Palms," "Paper on the Wall," and other catchy songs. Refined comedy is also worked into the play, and altogether a very entertaining act is staged.

**British News**

Aberdeen schoolboys who are accustomed to manual work at the day classes of the Aberdeen School Board are present engaged in Skene St. Public School in making periscopes for use in the trenches at the front. A sample periscope was forwarded to the War Office, and so satisfied were the authorities with the make and efficiency that an order was received to have a quantity dispatched to London. The order is being carefully carried through under the supervision of the manufacturing instructor.  
Edinburg Glaziers some time ago asked their employers for an increase in wages of 1-2d per hour. At a meeting held in India, the other day afternoon it was stated that all the principal firms had granted the increase, and the others were expected to give the increase. The rate of pay will therefore be 1d per hour. The membership of the Society at present stands at 28. Before the war it was about 60. The difference between these two totals represents the number on military service.

A strange foster mother is to be seen at Upper Muirden, Alva, Scotland. A farmer on going his daily round of the fields one morning found that his pony had given birth to a fine foal over night, and what was more remarkable still, a dairy cow whose maternal instinct, must have been very strong, had taken the young creature under her fostering care, and was showing great fondness for the object of her adoption. As the real mother had no milk, the farmer allowed the cow to suckle the foal, and the strange sight of a foal being tenderly reared by a cow may be seen any day at Muirden.

An infuriated cow caused considerable excitement the other day in the Dalny district. It was being driven to the slaughter-house when it became unmanageable and before its career was ended it injured six people. It attacked a boy of five years, and threw him in the air, then ran into a common stair and attacked two children. Subsequently a driver attempted to stop it, but he also was tossed, and further on a man in attempting to lasso the animal, was also thrown; while a woman was later attacked and injured. Ultimately it was driven into a close and slaughtered by a butcher.

An Antarctic collection by Sir Ernest Shackleton has been placed in Dundee Museum. The birds, which were sent by Sir Ernest Shackleton to Sir James Caird, Bart., Dundee, and the latter, after having the birds carefully stuffed and placed in the proper setting, has gifted them to the Dundee Museum. The birds consist of the king penguin, the blue-eyed shag, the night hawk, the Cape pigeon, the snow petrel, and the diving petrel, the dove petrel, and the dominican or black-backed gull. The floor of the case represents an Antarctic beach, with rocks in the background, and an indication of a sunset. The snow petrel is shown in the air flying, the gull has just alighted on the seashore, with wings extended and the other birds occupy natural positions on the rocks.

A charge of shooting and killing a supposed burglar was preferred in the Glasgow High Court the other day against a Port Glasgow man. The defendant lives alone with his mother, who awoke on the morning of June 29 and saw someone leaving her bedroom. Prisoner told a constable that he saw a man running along the road and fired a shot from the window, to frighten him. An examination of the road resulted in bloodstains being traced and a well known housebreaker, was found lying on the roadway with his boots off. He died later. The Crown prosecutor asked for a verdict of "culpable homicide," but the jury after retiring for a few minutes unanimously found the prisoner not guilty.

Mr. Brown for many years carried on the business of piano and organ maker on Albion and Richmond Sts., but had retired from all business for the past year. He was 77 years old. He was a man of very inventive genius and an all round good citizen.
