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## WHO WILL BE WARDEN

There is considerable discussion as to who will be warden the next three years. The Liberals still having their former majority will be able to elect whomever the party chooses and the other aspirants will have to sit tight and according to a homely saying—grin and bear it.

Councillor Campbell of Ward 2 is the most likely one to land the position. He has been deputy warden for many years and has knowledge of the work the capabilities of a presiding officer and a long and successful business training.

There are many who claim that Councillor Gaul of Dalhousie is entitled to the position. He is the Nestor of the Council having seen continuous service for over 25 years, taking the place of the late Councillor Mack. It is doubtful if any other councillor in the Province has such a remarkable record. The fact that he never aspired for the position of warden accounts for him never occupying that position. But now his friends claim for him the right to the first position in the Council as a fitting tribute to his long and most honorable record.

Another name frequently heard is that of Councillor Kinsman from Ward 1 the most populous Ward in the County. He has not long been a member of the Council but for many years was County Auditor and became familiar with all the business transactions of the County and the mode of procedure from his attendance at the meetings. His supporters claim for him a better knowledge of County affairs than any other member elect.

The Conservatives being in the minority, as usual, have no present say in the matter. Of their number Councillor Anderson holds the record nearer to that of Councillor Gaul than any other.

WHY NOT THE NEXT  
LIEUT.-GOVERNOR  
FROM KINGS COUNTY

The death of Lieut.-Governor MacKeen leaves a very important position to be filled by the Ottawa Government. The position has been held by men of conspicuous ability and such will be required for the next incumbent of office.

We wish to call special attention to the fact that right here in Kings County we have one who is eminently qualified for the position. Mr. Barclay Webster of Kentville is a man who has been prominently before the public for many years. He has long been a practicing barrister and for many years has held the position of Kings Council. As Recorder and Stipendiary Magistrate he has safely advised and guided the Town officials of Kentville for a score of years and more. He has all the mental ability and social dignity required for the office and has knowledge of the constitutional requirements and responsibilities of the office of Lieutenant-Governor. Moreover he is a man of independent means, and it is well known that one who occupies that position requires more than the income from the office to entertain as the custom seems to require.

Mr. Webster also qualifies from a political standpoint. He belongs to a family of steady-support Conservatives back beyond his father's day. Mr. Webster upholds all that is good in the Conservatives and is ever ready to condemn their shortcomings. He led the poll in a provincial contest and was recognized as a leader in political thought and action while he was a member.

No one whose name has been mentioned in the Province has better right or more pronounced qualifications for that office.

## 1,820 SHIPS SUNK.

One thousand eight hundred and twenty ships, with an aggregate gross tonnage of approximately 3,326,584 have been sunk by belligerent nations during twenty-seven months of war ending November 1, according to figures compiled from cable despatches and mail advices and published recently by the New York Journal of Commerce.

The losses during October were larger than for any one of the preceding five months, according to the statistics, amounting to 127 vessels of a total of 227,153 tons gross.

Norway lost the largest number of ships, 56 according to the statistics, but their tonnage was only 57,333, as compared with Great Britain's total loss of 115,546 gross tonnage of 38 vessels destroyed.

A table showing the total shipping since the war began estimates those of Entente Allies at about 75 per cent, and those of neutrals at about 18 per cent, with Teutonic losses less than 7 per cent.
