### RAILWAY PROJECTS

The Ottawa Free Press correspondent is informed on excellent authority that a movement is on foot to construct an eastern line between Ottawa and Brockville, making use of the patent water powers between the two places and tapping the rich agricultural lands and thriving villages scattered over the proposed route. The distance by the C. P. R. is now 74 miles, and at this session the charter for an electric line was renewed. Your correspondent has information of an indisputable nature that English capitalists are back of the project and that their representative will in a few days go over the proposed route and make a full investigation. The new line would be a great convenience to the many residents of Ottawa and Northern points who summer on the St. Lawrence.

An Ottawa despatch says: another project that is now engaging the capitalists behind the B. W. & N. W. line and indeed others as well is the construction of a road to connect Brockville with the north country by way of Perth. This can best done by utilizing the B. W. & N. W. as far as Athens and then striking across country through as platted piece of territory, bridging the Rideau at Olliver's Ferry, thence to Perth and on north to Lanark.

From Athens to Perth is about twenty-three miles, from there to Lanark eleven miles, from the latter place Brockville and the St. Lawrence could be reached by traversing less than fifty miles.
