At a Terrible Fire in the Hospital Section of the Rochester Asylum.

Rochester, N. Y., Jan. 8.—Fire broke out in the hospital section of the Rochester or han asylum at 1 o'clock this morining on Hubbell Park, and the flames spread rapidly to other sections of the institution. It is known that nineteen of the children perished and it is feared that many more victims may be reported later.

The fire was first discovered by two men passing the asylum. They hasti-

men passing the asylum. They hasti-ly sent in an atarm, and then turned their attention toward arrousing the nurses and the children. A terrific explosion was then heard, and in a moment the entire hospital section was in flames. On the arrival of the fire apparatus a general alarm was sent in, calling on the entire depart-

The smoke began to pour out of every window in the main building and the screams and frantic cries of the children could beheard. The work of The ladies of the W. C. T. several institutions. There were 109 children at the hos pital and a corps of about 30 nurses and attendants. Two of the women attendants are among the dead. The origin of the fire is not known at this time. The property loss will probably exceed \$20,000.
