## MUCK RAKE IS HUNG UP

But Only For A Time As Far  
As Ontario Bank  
Goes

A FORTNIGHT'S REMAND

Toronto, Oct. 19.—President Cockburn  
and ex-manager McGill of the Ontario  
Bank will be formally arraigned this  
morning in the Police Court, and a  
remand for a fortnight is expected by  
those interested in the case.

What Crown Will Contend.  
That for five years Charles McGill  
manipulated the monthly statements of  
the Ontario Bank in order to conceal  
losses in the market now aggregating  
almost a million and a half of dollars;  
that for five years the monthly mis-  
statement of the bank's affairs were  
signed by the president of the bank as  
being a truthful and accurate return  
of its condition.

This in substance will be the conten-  
tion in the trial of the president and  
the ex-manager of the Ontario Bank.  
The Crown counsel will traverse the  
road which Charles McGill has travel-  
led since November of 1901. "The mis-  
statements marking that road are the al-  
leged fraudulent reports, sixty of them,  
which he sent to the Finance Minister  
of Canada, and the end of it is the  
dock in Magistrate Denison's court."

Worry Tells on Him.  
The worry of the past few days since  
the exposures of the bank's troubles  
has told on him. He evidently has  
his short confinement in the cells  
much to heart. He found a small cell  
with a hard bench and nothing to look  
through but an iron grating greatly dif-  
ferent from what he had been accus-  
tomed to.

In an interview Mr. McGill is quoted  
as saying: "None of the directors has  
loans from the funds of the bank, and  
they were not aware of all the things  
going on. I believe there are loans to  
the extent of three or four thousand  
dollars in which some of the directors'  
names figure, but not to themselves."

Mr. Cockburn Not Alarmed.  
"Think of it," said Mr. Cockburn, "the  
president of the Bank of Montreal must  
sign a return which certifies to the ex-  
act condition of 133 branches. He can't  
possibly do that upon his personal  
knowledge. He must rely implicitly  
upon the good faith of his general man-  
ager."

Of Mr. McGill's arrest he said:

"Too bad! I am very sorry for him.  
But what else could they do?"

"But suppose that Mr. Cockburn  
signed the returns, not knowing that  
they were false?" was the question put  
to Crown Attorney Corley.

"The very fact that false returns  
were signed is, under the act, taken as  
proof that they were wilfully signed,"  
he replied. "A bank president is sup-  
posed to know that what he is signing  
is correct. He must take the neces-  
sary steps to verify it."

Shareholders May Sue.  
The shareholders are still indignant  
at the transfer to the Bank of Mon-  
real for \$150,000. It is said that if the  
matter had been properly handled, the  
good-will and connection might have  
brought \$1,000,000. The sudden panic  
of the directors, which led to the  
slaughter, arose from the necessity of  
making a return to the Government  
on the 15th. To avoid this, the trans-  
fer was hurried through on the 13th,  
the 14th being Sunday.

A. B. Ames intimates that the share-  
holders may begin some proceedings  
to-day. This will probably result in  
leave being asked of the court by cer-  
tain shareholders to sue for the benefit  
of, and in the name of, the bank.

The curator, Mr. Staver, appointed  
by the Canadian Bankers' Association,  
has taken charge of all the affairs of  
the Ontario Bank, and the books and  
papers of that institution are in his  
custody and absolutely in his control.

It will be several weeks before any  
definite statement of the bank's condi-  
tion may be looked for.

Forced to Leave Boarding-House.

Ottawa, Oct. 19.—Harry Stevens of  
the Governor-General's Foot Guards,  
who accompanied the detachment of  
that regiment to Buckingham, to help  
suppress the miners' riots, has since  
been asked by his landlord to leave his  
boarding-house. There are seven union  
mechanics boarding in the house and  
they handed the ultimatum to the land-  
lord that it was a case of either losing  
seven boarders or none.

Says Liquor Did It.

Vancouver, B. C., Oct. 19.—James  
Dale, a boarding-house keeper of Cam-  
mi, B. C., who shot and killed two  
men, and wounded a third, was cap-  
tured Wednesday at Greenwood. David  
Smith, the third victim, is believed to  
be dying. Dale says that he was in-  
toxicated when the shooting took place.

Irish Government.

Liverpool, Oct. 19.—In an address de-  
livered here last night, Richard Robert  
Cherry, Attorney-General for Ireland,  
announced that the Government would  
introduce a measure for the establish-  
ment of an even more extended system  
of constitutional government for Ire-  
land.

Bad Fire at Birmingham, Ala.

Birmingham, Ala., Oct. 19.—Fire,  
which broke out after midnight in the  
six-story building of the Howell  
Hardway Co. on First avenue, burned  
for six hours and caused a loss of  
about \$800,000.

The Provincial Loan.

Toronto, Oct. 19.—Hon. Mr. Matheson  
reports that the \$3,000,000 provincial  
loan is attracting investors more ac-  
tively of late, and considerably less than  
a million new remains to be subscribed.

Home Mission Day.

Peterboro, Oct. 19.—Yesterday was  
Home Mission Day at the Baptist con-  
vention. Several impressive addresses  
were delivered, and most encouraging  
reports were presented.

St. Petersburg, Oct. 17.—After in-  
vestigating the killing of Mile. Semen-  
ova, the young medical student con-  
fined in the Central Prison of St. Pet-  
ersburg, who was shot dead by a sentry  
Sept. 10, when she showed the above  
at the window of her cell overlooking the  
court-yard, the commander of the St.  
Petersburg garrison has thanked the  
soldier who killed the girl, and has  
given him a reward of \$5. In addition,  
the soldier is upheld in the order of the  
day as an example to his comrades of  
the faithful performance of duty.

Capture 49 Terrorists.

Warsaw, Russian Poland, Oct. 17.—  
The police yesterday discovered the  
headquarters of an elaborately organ-  
ized band of terrorists and captured  
49 members of the band, who are  
charged with having committed many  
murders and robberies.

INTERNATIONAL S. S. LESSON  
FOR TO-MORROW.

Parable of The Talents.—Matt. 25,  
14-30.

Golden Text—A faithful man shall  
abound with blessings.—Prov. 20.

Our last lesson gave us a prophet-  
ic outline of the church's condition,  
trimming her lamps and making  
her self ready for the Lord's coming.  
—Rev. 19, 6-7.

In this lesson our Lord shows us  
the church's duty in His absence and

like; there were those with and  
without oil,—having not the spirit,—  
now it is with or without faith, fi-  
delity and love to their Lord and  
Master as manifested by their works.

spiritual—James 1, 17—"every good  
gift and every perfect gift is from  
above,"—see descriptions I. Cor. 12,  
4-11, and Eph. 6, 7-13.

God alone knows what gifts as  
His capital He can best entrust us  
with "to profit withal," our respon-  
sibility is according to our capacity  
to use, and to be used ourselves, to  
promote the progress and prosperity  
of the work of the Holy Spirit  
amongst mankind through our gifts,  
opportunities and all our belongings.

He who hides his Lord's money is  
the professor who neglects to stir  
up the gift that is in him, but  
"sows to the flesh and of the flesh  
reaps corruption," his reckoning  
time will assuredly come; so will  
that of the Lord's faithful servants,  
who are rewarded according to their  
works,—see verses 19, 20, 21.—the  
future life of God's children will be  
of activity and power.

The Lord commends the good and faith-
