BASEBALL.—A very interesting game of baseball was played on Saturday afternoon last between teams selected from the Wolfville Baseball Club and captained by Messrs E. W. Sawyer and W. S. Wallace. There is good material in the club and we expect them to do some good playing should they meet a foreign team during the summer—which we hope they may. In the past Wolfville cricketers have ranked high and now that football is taking the place of this grand old game we expect to see no less proficiency in this more modern game.

The Central Baptist Association.

This Association, which is holding its meetings this year at Gasperau, embraces the counties of King's, Hants, Halifax and Lunenburg. Instead of meeting as formerly on Saturday, this year the sessions commenced on Thursday (yesterday) at two o'clock. We cannot therefore report proceedings in this issue of the ACADIAN, but can outline the probable order of the services.

Thursday afternoon after devotional exercises and the election of officers for the ensuing year, the sermon was to have been delivered by the Rev. H. Foshy of Windsor. The afternoon session was to have been favored by reports of Associate committees. During the Friday morning session, if the recommendation of the committee of arrangement be accepted, historical sketches of several churches will be presented and reports of committees on benevolent funds and denominational literature. On Friday afternoon it is proposed to discuss the subject of Sabbath-schools. At the same hour the ladies of the W. M. A. Society will hold their meeting in the hall. A mass missionary meeting may be expected on Friday evening and stirring addresses. Saturday forenoon will be devoted to the subject of education. This subject is likely to awaken a great deal of enthusiasm. Baptists believe in education for the sons and daughters of these provinces; and they are striving to make Acadia and her affiliated schools worthy of the honored position she maintains. Saturday afternoon will be devoted to matters relating to the spiritual life and prosperity of the churches. It is proposed to hold a mass temperance meeting Saturday evening. Preaching services will be held on the Sabbath at Gasperau in the morning, at Greenfield in the afternoon, at Black River in the morning, at White Rock in the afternoon, and at Walbrook in the evening. The last meeting will be held in the evening for prayer and conference. Some of the preachers may also be expected to preach in Wolfville on the Sabbath.

—In the absence of Rev. T. D. Hart, who is attending the Wesleyan Annual Conference in Halifax, Rev. D. O. Parker will supply his pulpit next Sabbath morning.

—Mr Parker has a fine show of furniture in his new warehouse. He represents this paper in Berwick and takes subscriptions for it and orders for advertisements and job printing.

—The Annapolis district of the Methodist church held its district meeting in Berwick last week and was well represented. We learn that it has enjoyed a year of prosperity. During the session two candidates for the ministry preached with much acceptance.

—"Lo! the poor Indian!" A few days since we were shown a very perfect stone arrow-head which T. H. Parker, Esq., found in his field a few rods from the banks of the Cornwallis river. It is not often that aboriginal relics are found in this locality and it is probable that this one was shot from the Indian's bow and lost, when in the long past the Indian's canoe navigated our modest river.

—Mr L. D. Robinson, the late principal of the Berwick school, and who is now taking a vacation on his farm in Berwick, has seven acres appropriated to small fruits under the highest cultivation. Five acres are planted with strawberries and the other two with raspberries, gooseberries and currants. He also keeps more than one hundred hens and since January has dozen eggs and a large quantity of enriching poultry for his land. His enterprise with fowl he claims to be very remunerative.

—In the interests of the people as well as in the interests of the railroad, Mr Innis appears to be doing the fair and generous thing relative to the new station in Berwick and the adjacent grounds. The foundation for the new building is one of the most thorough pieces of mason work we have seen in Berwick. The frame was raised this week and the work on it is progressing quite rapidly. A new and thorough siding has been laid on the opposite side of the road and men are now levelling the grounds and making a road on the South side, and we expect soon to see, in the place of stubs and bushes, clean and well kept grounds.
